A Summary of the BMA of Missouri Annual Meeting October 25 - Bethel, Sikeston

Following a song, welcome, and then a morning devotional by Webb Manley, the eighty-first annual meeting of the BMA of Missouri was called to order by moderator Jerry Adams. The final enrollment report showed 24 churches represented by 49 messengers, and 22 churches represented by letter only. Minute fund offerings for the day totaled \$2,725.

In the absence of both the clerk and assistant clerk, the election of a clerk was the first item of business, and Don Burke was elected to fill that position immediately.

Jamie Jones shared the work of the ALIVE Committee and the plans for the upcoming ALIVE Conference. The conference will be January 1-3, and the speaker will be BMA Pastor Mark Livingston. A number of changes are slated for this conference.

Several constitutional changes were discussed and approved. Camp trustees may now serve consecutive terms. A change allowing a broader use of the Missiouri Missionary Baptist paper was also approved. (See details below.) One of the rules for Associational membership (Article III, section 3) was changed from two to three years, and now reads, "Any church not identifying with the Association either by messenger or letter for three consecutive years shall be considered as having terminated her membership in this Association."

Meeting Place for 2009 Annual Meeting Needed

Due to the confusion noted in the report, we do not have a place to hold the 2009 Annual Meeting of the BMA of Missouri. The biggest constitutional change involved the restructuring of the Revolving Loan Committee, including changing its name to Missouri Missionary Baptist Loan Association, Inc. These changes were made to better assure repayment of loans.

The Association voted to approve the following recommendations from the Missionary Committee:

- To set the financial partnership support for Bro. Jamie Jones' mission work at Smithville, MO at \$1,800 a month.
- To phase out financial support of Abundant Life in Christ Missionary Baptist Mission in Charleston, MO. Support will be incrementally decreed by \$50 each month with phase-out completed in one year.

National Brotherhood Project

The young Capeverdean church planter rises early in the morning on Friday; he needs to be at the port by 7 a.m. in order to catch the ferry boat for the one-hour ride to the neighboring island. He lives on one island where he is studying in the Bible Institute, and he is planting a church on the neighboring island. He arrives on the neighboring island and waits for a van to take him on the three-hour journey to his ministry area. Upon arrival, he will spend the majority of his day visiting the people, then in the evening he will begin some of his small group Bible studies. On Saturday, he will spend the majority of the day in evangelism and discipleship groups. In the afternoon he will meet with his leadership team in order to talk about the work and to plan for the services on Sunday. Saturday evening he will attend a fellowship for the members that will go late into the night. Sunday morning he will prepare for Sunday school and then will meet with his worship leaders for a planning session for the night service which is, in Capeverdean culture, the most important worship service of the week. He will also have time to lead a couple more discipleship studies before the evening service. After the service on Sunday night he will normally have several people to counsel about salvation, baptism, discipleship, and others with major issues in their lives.

He awakes at 5 a.m. on Monday morning to start the trip back to the island where he studies. He will arrive just in time to gather his things and go to class.

This is an actual account of the life of a Capeverdean church planter. This year the **National Brotherhood** has chosen to help the Capeverdean national workers by raising funds for their ministry.

You may fail to see the urgency of your participation in the lives of Capeverdean church planters; however, please look again. Without our support the church planter would not have a Bible Institute, books, transportation funds, a place to meet, materials for discipleship, Bibles, a place to sleep, and a host of other ministry tools. The prospects for sending more church planters to other islands and villages really do depend greatly on our ability to partner with them in their missionary service.

The National Brotherhood project for 2008-2009 is 25% Galileans and 75% Cape Verde National Workers. Thanks to Dr. John David Smith for providing the information in this article about the Cape Verde work.

Further, any group that espouses a doctrine and/or belief contrary to the teaching of Scripture and/or our mission, and that challenges our right to those beliefs, will not be given a voice.
