

January 12th I attended a meeting at the BMAA Global Office in Conway, Arkansas. This meeting was for the purpose of discussing ways our various state associations could coordinate disaster relief efforts whenever the need arises.

This past year we had several national and world disasters in which the BMA of America churches were involved in sending relief money and personnel. It was then we realized we need a plan that would help us do the most good without duplicating the efforts of the various ones who want to help.

Some of our state associations have already organized relief groups but many are like us in Missouri who just get a group together and go when the need arises. That is good but it could be better as we worked together.

As a result of this meeting we were challenged to try to do our part in unifying relief efforts starting with organizing a data base which could be used to recruit help nationally when disasters strike.

Therefore I am searching for a volunteer who is willing to contact our Missouri Churches and compile a list of people who are willing to be contacted when help is needed. This list would include how they can be contacted and what abilities and resources they have that could be utilized when needed. I am also searching for a volunteer to be our "Contact Person" whenever there is help needed. These two positions can be filled by the same person. If you are interested in both or either of these responsibilities please let me know and we can discuss what we have in mind.

This is a good idea that will be very helpful when it is initiated and disaster comes.

The latest news from the Missionary Family that are part of the 2017-18 WMA Project

It has been awhile since we have updated. If you follow us on facebook you have seen the outstanding results of the Christmas Angels Outreach. Together we collected over 380 Christmas Gifts to share with the Navajo Children. We also took a van full of groceries, winter coats, and gently used clothing items to a needy family in Black Mesa, AZ. As many of you know we reach out to our supporting churches to make this outreach possible every Christmas. And every Christmas we receive amazing support and donations from so many of you; when we say that this ministry and specifically this outreach would not be possible without you we mean that with all of our hearts. Many families and

churches from back east collect donations, and send gifts for us to distribute; Lighthouse Baptist Church in Cortez has faithfully helped us wrap these gifts the past several years, and we are so thankful to announce that this year Mexican Water Baptist Church stepped up in a huge way and helped us pass out all of these gifts. This year

our family only had 100 gifts to pass out on our own. Our church distributed the gifts between many of the members and they each went a different direction with a vehicle of gifts and to share and the message of Christ with our local community. It was a blessing to see our members getting involved in another area of ministry.

During the month of February we have a one day Teen Conference scheduled with guest speaker, Bro. Zack Terry. And we have a Valentines Fellowship planned for our church family. We are looking forward to both of these outreach opportunities.

We have several prayer requests in the church currently as we have several, including our family that has been sick, a couple men who are struggling with alcohol (Alberta's brother and Shane Spencer), and families who are wanting to take on more responsibility in the church but haven't committed to do so yet. Also Ms Sophie had a niece who passed away this past month. She was 31 years old and leaves behind a husband and three young children. Please remember these requests in your prayers, we would greatly appreciate it and so would our church family.

2018 Vision

As 2018 is now here and we look forward to what the year has in store we are excited to share with you our Vision Letter for the upcoming year. Our main goal and focus will be to build the church through doctrinal teaching and discipleship of our members. It continues to be our burden and prayer that we will see the church grow. While numerically is always a blessing, we seek to see our members grow spiritually giving strength to the church foundation and outreach into the community.

As we look at 2018 we have some goals and as we share these we ask that you join us in prayer that God would work and we will be able to see great things accomplished in 2018.

#2. Continue the construction and updates on the church building and fellowship hall. We were able to make numerous updates in 2017, but we still need to finish new flooring in the church building and also move the cooler location to prevent leaking on the church roof.

Personal Prayer Request:

In 2018 our family will experience many changes as we see Trenton graduate in May and we bring him to college in August. As this is a very exciting time in every Senior's life it is a new parenting step for us.

Andy continues to work a full time in Durango, Colorado to supplement our family's needed personal income and insurance needs. God has blessed us with growth in our Mission income but at this time we still rely on Andy's income for many of our needs. It is due to Andy's full time schedule and Ministry schedule that we do not have plans to do any deputation in 2018. We will gladly conference call, FaceTime, or present a dvd update to any church who wishes this communication. We praise the Lord for your faithfulness in supporting our ministry the past six years, we would love to extend an invitation to all of you to visit this ministry that you support in prayer and finances. It would be our blessing to have you visit and see the Navajo Nation to which God has called us.

I just have to end by saying God is good!!!! In May we will begin our seventh year of ministry to the Navajo Nation! NEVER did I think that we would have a waiting list for any ministry outreach that we did, and never did I think that the time would pass so quickly. But here we are and we can easily say that we have never been hungry, and we have never been bored! Thank you for your continued prayers and support of our family and the ministry that the Lord has called us to. We are blessed to be your missionaries to the Navajo Nation.

Grace Baptist Church has a Heart for Local and Global Missions

Why does Grace Baptist Church in Joplin, Missouri participate in global Missions?

According to their Pastor, Brad Wieneke, "The easy Sunday school answer: It's what Jesus told us to do in Matthew 28:19! The mission that we have been called to is easier to accomplish if we work together. We support BMA Missions because we believe we can do more together than we can apart. Our association of churches gives us the ability to reach and serve beyond ourselves, and trained missionaries give us confidence that we are being good stewards of what God has given us here at GBC!"

Grace Baptist Church believes that people will be more eager to give toward missions, and BMA Missions specifically, if they know the missionary. As a result, they try to connect with and invite as many missionary families as possible to speak at their church and share about the gospel work they are fulfilling on their mission field.

"Sometimes they are on the mission field and we put the [Skype] video up on our big screen and just talk to them, allow our people to ask questions, and get updates on how they are doing, where they need prayer and even extra support for projects or other things," explained Pastor Wieneke. "Then we pray for that missionary family together as a church. It really helps our people in their giving and feeling connected; we have skin in the game with that family and what God is doing in their lives on the mission field!"

Specifically, GBC supports the Hales family in the Dominican Republic, the Sookraj family in Peru, and several American church plants. They not only give, though, but they also send their members on short-term trips to these mission fields.

Not only does GBC have a heart for missions around the world, but they also strive to reach the lost around their own community in Joplin. Their mission is stated as follows: "We exist to equip, train & send people to love God, love others & to make disciples."

"Our mission field is within 1 square mile of the church," said Wieneke. "There are 14,000 people that need to hear about Jesus and the good news. We are doing that by going door-to-door using the model of Pray / Care / Share! The reason we are doing door-to-door is to let our community know that we are here, and we have not done a good job in the past of serving them, but we want the opportunity to pray for them and to care for them. When we pray and care we are looking for an opportunity to share Jesus with them. The gospel does its best work when it is done relationally, so the door-to-door for us is good practice for our people to see the need in the community, but to also see the need and use the model of Pray/Care /Share in their relationships at work, school and with family."

In addition, this church hosts two events per year called "Faith in the Field," where the church gets outside of the building and invites the community to worship with them in the local park. GBC also invests in their community through a food pantry, by supporting Life Choices (a Christian pregnancy center), and the Rapha House (a ministry that works with sex-trafficked girls).

"Our natural tendency is to be focused on us and what we need and want. God has called us to walk in the Spirit, and the Holy Spirit only wants to talk about Jesus everywhere

"We don't have any answers, but we are growing in our understanding of what God has called us to and we are regularly looking at what is effective for the kingdom of God! We want to be found faithful when he comes or calls us home."

LifeWord • VISION 2018

During the Lifeword team's first staff meeting of 2018, Executive Director Donny Parrish shared the vision and direction that God has put in his heart. While the fifty-plus-year vision of spreading the gospel through media has not and will not change, the method of delivery has changed immeasurably. Donny made the following points about those changes:

1) **A more diversified ministry:** Internet is increasingly how we spread gospel, and we will take advantage of it. Communicating the gospel to the whole world through the new Lifeword Network and LCR (Lifeword Community Radio) has increased ministry around the world and will become who we are globally. The Great Commission says we're to make disciples, and a natural by-product of discipleship is the planting of new churches. Our partnership with BMA Missions will be even more intentional as we come alongside them to help establish strong new missions.

2) **The Cloud as our brand and our identity:** We have bought the domain name "Jesus To You." So when people all over the world search the name "Jesus" or "Who is Jesus?" or go to JesusToYou.com, they'll be directed to lifeword.org. We want as many people groups as possible to find their language then find out who Jesus is from print and video resources.

3) **A de-centralized ministry:** To be able to do what we do around the world, we must not think of our office in Conway, Arkansas. Leaders, on-air personalities, and broadcasters around the world will be identified, trained and supported by Lifeword USA, but we want Lifeword to be thought of as a globally based ministry instead of a "land-mass" ministry. We'll be investing in all kinds of media personnel around the world who will be "broadcast missionaries."

4) **A dynamic leadership team:** The Lifeword team must be prepared to adapt to and run with this new global paradigm.

- Someone needs to be leading people around the world, someone like Luis Ortega, who will be our Director of Operations. With his technical and communication skills, he'll develop the timeline and method of implementing this globally-based effort.

- We need an English-language radio station and we must have good, time-tested broadcast training for our new leaders. Rick Russell will be Director of Broadcast Equipping and Training.

- Jon Dodson is Director of Internet Broadcasts and Marketing. With his technology skills and decades of experience, he is already working on Cloud implementation and will join our team on a full-time basis June 1.

- Unless we have good support from our churches, we can't do what we do. Someone has to tell them the story of what Lifeword is and does, so Holly Meriweather is our Director of Church Connections.

- Even though he will be assuming his new MRS (Ministers Resource Services) role, we are blessed that Steve Crawley will continue to help us on the financial front.

By May 2018 the Cloud will be built; that's Phase One, then we have to get content to the Cloud. In five languages-English, Spanish, Swahili, Arabic and Garifuna - we will answer the question, "What is Jesus to You?" Phase 2 is streaming to our LCR stations around the world.

About this new way of operating, Donny said, "God will allow us to be tested during this time, but this is our battle plan, and He has equipped us. We ask that God superintend Lifeword while we simply participate in His ministry."



Something to Think About:

The Bible and God's Providence

John 5:13

"These things have I written unto you that believe on the name of the Son of God; that ye may know that ye have eternal life, and that ye may believe on the name of the Son of God."

The apostle John lead by the Holy Spirit stated that one of the reasons God gave us the Scriptures was to provide assurance of salvation. Subjective faith is the believer's own story of how God convicted them of sin and how they came to know Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior. However, subjective faith depends on objective revelation of truth as revealed in God's Word. In other words, God's Word must support salvation faith to be genuine.

Example, A person depending on works such as Baptism or the Lord's Supper to get to heaven cannot use God' Word to support their belief. Ephesians 2:8-9, "For by grace are ye saved through faith; and that not of yourselves: it is the gift of God: Not of works, lest any man should boast."

There is an interesting story concerning the Bible and God's Providence in Twelfth Century Church History. Did you know that the Church Council of Valencia in (1229) forbade men who were not priests to read the Bible and the Bible was placed on The Index of Forbidden Books? This was the result of the conflict between the Roman Church and a Frenchmen named Peter Waldo. Around 1170, Pe-

ter Waldo employed a priest to translate from Latin into French the four Gospels and certain other books of the Scriptures.

By God's providence, Waldo saw the truths of God's Word and wanted to practice them. Waldo realized that the Scriptures alone are the basis of faith and not the word of any human being, be he priest, bishop, or pope. He learned that there is but one

Mediator, that saints should not be worshipped, and that the Lord Jesus Christ instituted only two sacraments; Baptism and the Lord's Supper.

In 1177 Peter Waldo organized a society of men and women who were willing to help bring Bible truth before their fellows. The members of this society are known in Church History by the name Waldenses. They were also known as "the poor men of

Lyons." (Houghton, 63)
The truth that we can learn from Peter Waldo's story is the importance of people having the Word of God published in their own language so that they can read and search the Scriptures themselves.

The Scriptures provide assurance of salvation and understanding on how to worship God in an acceptable manner. By studying the

Scriptures, one can discover eternal life hope though Jesus Christ.

An open letter to BMA Readers

Dr. Charley Holmes, BMA Seminary President

The Seminary staff and administration are praying that all our churches and their families will experience Christ's peace during 2018. I'd like to take just a few minutes to update you on some matters of prayer for your BMA Seminary.

Financially, things are steady and we have a small operating surplus for the fiscal year to date. Our end of the year giving seems to have been a little stronger than the past few years which helped us go from a moderate deficit to a surplus. One substantial source of income for the last seven years will be unable to help us for the immediate future. With that in mind, we are making final adjustments now for next year's budget year which begins June 1. One of our trustees has informed me that the Lord has led their church to vote to increase their current support to the Seminary by an excess of 100%. Another long-time board member gives regular generous designated offerings through his church in addition to helping with special projects. This kind of news is greatly appreciated by me and other administrators.

I haven't studied the support of each individual BMA church, but I know that many of them do support the Seminary in some way. As you enter the new year, consider leading your church to support the Seminary to at least the level that it supports other denominational efforts. I would be glad to arrange a visit to your church in the next year and report on the Seminary. It is amazing what God can do through faithful stewards who see a need and meet it.

Dr. Attebery is currently very busy with enrollment for the spring semester. There are not yet any enrollment projections available as it is too early in the process.

Matters of prayer - Please include these items in your family prayers and share them with your church:

1. Doctrinal and spiritual stability for our administrators, staff, teachers and students.

2. Financial stability for our supporting churches and individuals.

3. Our Bible-institute type ministry around the world, especially in Tanzania, Jordan and Tunisia. Our alumni around the world have several others we pray for, but these are the newest and most fragile. January 14th I taught a week-long class in Tanzania. The leader of that association, Bro. Renatus Kanunu, returned with me to attend courses on campus during the spring semester.

4. Thursday, February 15, we will be rededicating the refurbished Dorman Memorial Chapel at 10:00 a.m.
