The Cradle, a Christmas Story

They left their home, the new cradle still swinging from the rafters. Night after night the aroma of fresh-cut wood had filled the room as Joseph had patiently fashioned the tiny cradle, using the same chisel and saw he usually put down at dusk.

Now Joseph wiped the tears from Mary's cheeks and shut the door behind them. "It'll be okay," he told her, as he cinched up their belongings on the donkey.

"Joseph, can't we wait a few days? The baby could come any time." She didn't want to leave home. Not now.

"We've waited for the baby as long as we dare." He was ready to get on the road. "We have to leave today or I'll be arrested for not appearing in Bethlehem for the census."

"At least bring the cradle, Joseph," she pleaded. "I want the baby to have something nice."

"No, it'll have to stay behind. The baby will be rocking in it soon enough."

Joseph tugged hard at the donkey's halter. No luck. "Come on, animal," he shouted, whacking it on the rear end to get it moving. Grudgingly the donkey responded. With one hand Joseph led the donkey, with the other he steadied Mary on the steep incline, slowly enough to accommodate her ungainly progress down the winding road which led from Nazareth's height. In the house above, the cradle hung still.

Five days and ninety bone-weary miles later, Joseph searched the small stable where they were staying on the outskirts of crowded Bethlehem. Mary's time would be soon now. He was careful to keep his lamp from igniting the old straw. He finally settled on an ancient stone manger for the baby's bed, cut from the wall of the limestone cave which housed the animals. He reached in to scoop the last gritty bits of straw from the manger's dank bottom. "That'll have to do," he muttered. He filled the trough with an armful of fresh fodder, which he

covered with a folded blanket to keep the animals away.

It was well past midnight by the time Mary finished washing and wrapping her new baby. Now she lifted him gently into his new bed. Joseph put his arm around her shoulders as they gazed at the sleeping infant.

Mary touched the tiny fingers. "That cradle you spent so much time on would be real nice right now, Joseph." She looked up at the cave's low ceiling. "You could hang it somewhere. No baby I know has a cradle like that. It's fit for a king."

Joseph grinned. "Not every boy has a carpenter for a dad," he said. But he wondered. Why couldn't little Jesus be home in that cradle? Why does this special child the angel told Mary and him about have to be born in this smelly stable? A hill-country carpenter's home is bad enough. Why here? Why Bethlehem?

The answer wasn't long in coming. An older boy poked his head in the door, startling the couple from their quiet

Former Pastor, Missionary, and Evangelist Called Home

Jurl Norris Mitchell, 84 of Conway, died Nov. 15 after a lengthy illness.

He was a graduate of Central Baptist College and the University of Central Arkansas, and taught briefly at Vilonia High School. He was a BMA minister for 66 years, and pastored a number of churches in Arkansas. The last 20 years prior to retirement, he directed Plain Path Ministries as a full-time evangelist, preaching revivals mostly in the central states, but he also held many meetings in the Pacific northwest and in the northern U.S.

At one point, he served on the board of directors of Central Baptist College.

In the early 70s, he and his wife served as missionaries to Bolivia and taught in Santa Cruz at the American School for Gulf Oil corporation. Having acquired a private pilot's license, he assisted in flying supplies into remote jungle mission areas of Bolivia. Later, he and his family lived and worked among the Chiquitano Indians of eastern Bolivia, establishing a church in the village of San Simon. Giving an account of the years in Bolivia, Jurl authored two books: *En La Manana* and *Chiquitano*.

He was an avid outdoorsman, and loved to travel. He and his wife, Mary Ann traveled and camped over most of the continental U.S. and canoed many of the streams in Arkansas and Missouri. His favorite was Current River, which they floated a week at a time.

Another one of his favorite pastimes was four wheeling in the Ozark mountains of Arkansas. In later years, Jurl and Mary Ann bicycled and continued this activity into their 80s, cycling and camping all over Arkansas and Missouri.

He is survived by his wife of 67 years, Mary Ann Mitchell of Greenbrier; a son, Dwight (Cherri) Mitchell of Greenbrier; two sisters, Arlyn (Gene) Gambill of Greenbrier and Karen (Tom) Mitchell of Little Rock; two granddaughters and three great-grandchildren.

Funeral services were held Nov. 19 at Immanuel Baptist Church in Greenbrier, with Pastor Anthony Crocker, Gaylon King and Troy Vaughn officiating. Interment was at Thorn Cemetery under the direction of Roller Funeral Home.

Old Critters VRS. New Creatures

"Therefore, if any man be in Christ, he is a new creature: old things are passed away; behold, all things become new"
2 Cor. 5:17

Throughout my Christian life I have seen the truth of First Corinthians 5:17 begin to be demonstrated immediately by people after they have experienced the new birth. Old time preachers used to say of salvation, and consistent with the teaching in this verse, that "salvation turns old critters into new creatures." That's what salvation is supposed to do, and that's what it does do – when it's real.

The "new creature" produced at the time of salvation doesn't outwardly manifest all its spiritual newness immediately or overnight. But this process does begin immediately and overnight. There will be some noticeable changes, varying in type and number, right away; sometimes, really radical ones. The Bible tells us that there definitely are "things that accompany salvation" (Heb. 6:9).

I've seen countless examples of people who were instantaneously delivered from addictions they'd had for years. I've seen people who'd been mean all their lives become kind, crooked people become honest and sensual-minded people become spiritually-minded people. I've seen unsaved couples, headed for the divorce court on Monday who got saved the previous Sunday and from that day forward, and for decades now, have lived together happily as dedicated Christians. I could fill page after page with examples like these that I have personally witnessed.

A Christian will be in learning, growing and spiritually maturing process all their lives. But this process doesn't begin, as it were, ten or twenty years after they are saved. Old critters who get saved begin to sound, look and act something like new creatures to themselves and to others, as soon as they experience the new birth.

There some changes that new believers will want to make, and will make, in their lifestyles as soon as they are saved. There are plenty of illustrations of this cited throughout the New Testament. Consider the changes that took place in the case of the demoniac of Gadara (Mark 5:1-20), Zacchaeus (Luke 19:1-10), the Samaritan woman (John 4:1-39), the three thousand on the Day of Pentecost (Acts 2:37-47), those saved in the City of Ephesus (Acts 19:18-20) and the Apostle Paul (Acts 26:1-23), etc., etc., etc.

Old time Christians used to say that when people get saved, God changes their "wanters" and they begin to want certain things in their lives that they didn't want before salvation, and to not want some things in their lives that they did want in them before they were saved. For example, they will begin to "hunger and thirst after righteousness" (Matt. 5:6) "As new born babes," they will, "desire the sincere milk of the Word." (1 Pet. 2:2) There is something unscriptural about and terribly amiss with "critter-like" professed Christians who, have made a profession of faith, but have no interest in going to church, let alone following after holiness in their lives.

This "wanter" change that takes place when people get saved happens for two reasons: First, it happens because, at the time of their salvation, they have God the Father's nature, which is a holy nature, imparted to them (2 Pet. 1:4). From the point of salvation they have this something within them that is inclined towards, and wants, to live a life of obedience and holiness before God. Secondly, a new Christian's wanters is changed because, at the time of the new birth they are immediately indwelt by the Holy Spirit, Who begins immediately to work in them with the objective of provoking and producing holiness in their lives (Phil. 2:13).

Understanding God's desire for holiness in the lives of

believers is fundamental to understanding why old critters have to become new creatures in Christ Jesus. It has been God's plan, since the "foundation of the world that we should be holy and without blame before Him in love." God has commanded holiness from all of His children: "But as He which hath called you is holy, so be ye holy in all manner of conversation; Because it is written, Be ye holy; for I am holy" (1 Pet. 15, 16).

The fact is, that, where there is no desire for holiness and no demonstration of holiness there are no new creatures; just old critters; old unregenerate, as spiritually lost as can be, critters who have never been born of, and are not indwelt by, the Holy Spirit of God. These old critters that have never become new creatures, fill pews and pulpits throughout our country today. And unless they admit what they really are and exercise "repentance toward God, and faith in our Lord Jesus Christ" (Acts 20:21) they will be among those who fill up hell when they die.

The Bible says, "It is now high time to awake out of sleep" (Rom. 13:11). It's high time for Christians to stop staying in churches, and stop putting up with pastors, who deny in either word or deed, the truth of 2 Cor. 5:17. It's time for professed believers to heed the words of 2 Cor. 13:5: "Examine yourselves whether ye be in the faith;" and do this in light of whatever their attitude towards holiness is. It's time for believers who know that "the Spirit of God bears witness with their spirit, and that they are children of God" (Rom. 8:16) to be renewed in the spirit of their minds, and "put on the new man, which, after God, is created in righteousness and true holiness" (Eph. 4:24).

Heresies: Religious or ideological belief opposed to orthodoxy.

Envyings: A coveting for oneself of the good which someone else is enjoying.

Murders: The unlawful killing of a human being with malice aforethought.

Drunkness: Intoxicated by alcoholic drink. To become intoxicated. A person habitually drunk.

Revellings: To take intense pleasure, to be festive, to "revel all night long."

And such like: I John 2:15-17-- "Love not the world, neither the things that are in the world...for all that is in the world, the lust of the flesh, and the lust of the eyes, and the pride of life, is not of the Father...and the world passeth away, and the lust thereof: but he that doeth the will of God abideth forever."

Are You a Missionary?

Many times we focus on elected missionaries and miss seeing that ordinary people who seemingly never have a "call" to the mission field also play an important part in mission work. Let's look at one particular life that's a result of mission work. Just as Paul says in 1 Corinthians 3:6-7, *"I have planted, Apollos watered; but God gave the increase. So then neither is he that planteth any thing, neither he that watereth; but God that giveth the increase."* Many believers who were saved and then disciplined as a result of mission work in one form or another, can often look to several different missionaries who had a part along the way, but they know that ultimately, it was God who put those people in their paths and worked everything out in their lives.

Rose Ng is just such a person. This native of Vietnam became an adult without really knowing much about God or Jesus, other than through a friend as she grew up. Later, she felt the stress of life and decided to put an end to all of it. However, God intervened through a tree. Her clothes caught on a tree branch as she attempted to jump into the river. God had a reason for stopping Rose and she realized that there was something, or Someone, greater than she.

Rose calls Genesis 1:1 her salvation verse. Through reading the Bible on her own, she was saved. However, a mission of another Baptist group helped to disciple her. They also pointed her to a Christian institution where she could learn more. Although Rose didn't really intend to go to a Bible college, Bro. Doyle Moore convinced her that she needed to go there. That's how Rose became a student at the BMA Bible College in the Philippines when she had been a Christian only about three years. With only one month to prepare to go, Rose had to make many adjustments.

Doyle and Linda Moore took Rose under their wings and taught her through example what true missionaries are. She considers them her spiritual "Mom and Dad." She spent four years at the Bible College on scholarship and received her BA in religious education in spite of the fact that she already had a degree from Vietnam and a career making good money.

The decision was not an easy one for Rose because her career was established and she had no intention of becoming anything different. However, God had other plans. She heard a missionary talk about the children in Cambodia who needed

so much, both regular education as well as spiritual. That became a burden on Rose's heart.

While in the Philippines, others also influenced Rose along the way. Pat Quesenbury arrived in the islands twice for women's conferences. As usual, her dynamic Christian presentation and charming personality fused with Rose's enthusiasm and they became instant friends. Rose now considers Pat a mentor in her life. However, there are probably many more because Rose never really meets a stranger and she seems to learn something from everyone she meets.

For years, Bro. James Speer traveled to the Philippines to help them with their youth camp. That's how he and Rose became acquainted. Now Rose lives in the United States and considers James and Barbara Speer her family. Although Rose is a student at the BMA Theological Seminary working on her MA in ministry, she returns to Carthage to attend First Baptist Church with the Speers every chance she gets. In fact, the whole church has taken her in, as one member or another comes to pick her up and then returns her to Jacksonville when she goes, because Rose does not have a vehicle.

Stan and Donna Scroggins, also missionaries to the Philippines, helped Rose before she came to the United States. By that time, the Moores had retired and returned to the states. The Scroggins helped Rose get her visa. Then they helped raised the necessary funds that she would need in her endeavor.

Since Rose wants to return to Cambodia and began a K-12 school for the children of the boat people, she plans to remain in the United States to complete her PhD in education. As part of that, she wants to research how to set up a Christian school and how to be an administrator. While in Jacksonville, she has become friends with Stephanie Attebery, wife of the dean at BMATS. Because she teaches in a Christian school, Mrs. Attebery gives Rose insights into the world of educating students.

These are only a few of the Christians who have impacted Rose during her short life as a Christian. Notice that many of these were not what most of us would consider actual missionaries. Many more people have sent money and prayed for the work all over the world. You may think you don't have a part in anything like this; however, the Bible tells us all to go and teach. We can all disciple if we do what we should. Are you a missionary?

Siripong (Pastor Jo) Yaebeang and his family recently visited the BMA Theological Seminary and spoke about their work in Thailand. While Pastor Jo showed the video that his wife had put together, Jessie took their two children, Titus and Noah, out to play and burn up their excess energy. Although they are used to being in services weekly in Thailand, perhaps they are not used to the structure of a chapel service at the Seminary.

Pastor Jo, however, is very familiar with that structure, as he attended the Seminary from 2011 to 2014, after having attended Central Baptist College, where he met Jessie. Before coming to the United States, someone in Thailand had tried to discourage him from attending seminary. He was told that thousands would die in their sin while he was off studying. However, Pastor Jo felt God wanted him to learn more so that he would be able to answer the questions that would inevitably come during his ministry.

The country of Thailand is almost 100% unbelievers. Most people consider themselves Buddhist, with only 3% Islamic and about 1% Christian. In approximately 7000 provinces, over 6000 of them do not have a single church. However, in spite of that, the North Bangkok Church is gradually growing.

They have between 15 and 20 adults who meet, along with their children, each week in homes. Once a month, they choose to meet at a hotel where they are able to have more space and the children can be more energetic.

Most of the so-called churches in Thailand promote a prosperity gospel. People do not hear the Truth of the Word. Therefore, one thing that Pastor Jo is doing is answering questions about the Bible and Christianity in his Ask Pastor Jo videos. People sometimes tell him to "Stop wasting your time." However, he realizes it's not a waste of time when he sees people come to salvation, such as the young doctor who was recently baptized after being saved while they visited in a coffee shop. There are many doors to share the gospel.

Pastor Jo and his family have many prayer requests. One is to pray for a change in attitude that many in Thailand have; the people often believe that Christianity is not for them. Pray for open doors and for his preparation to share the gospel even when few show up. Also pray for the devotional book that Pastor Jo wrote to help people that he may never even meet. It's in the Thai language, but would be called "Walking with God: 365 Days in the Word of God."

The Yaebeang family is enjoying their time in the United States but look forward to returning to their home in Thailand where they work alongside Brandon Lingle and his family. Remember the North Bangkok Church with your prayers and offerings when possible.

Testimony of the Two Witnesses

Revelation 11:1-14

The place is Jerusalem and the time frame are the sounding of the sixth trumpet and the second woe or the middle of the seven-year tribulation period. The instruction to measure the temple demonstrates that we are on Jewish ground and that the nation of Israel is again worshipping at the restored temple built under the protection of the Antichrist. To make the temple refer to the church creates serious problems. If the church is still on the earth, as some believe, during the tribulation one must consider how could John measure all the local assemblies throughout the world? Furthermore, for those who believe that the church is a universal body of believers how could John measure the invisible body of believers? If the temple is the church, then who are the worshippers and what is the altar? And since the New Testament unites Jewish and Gentile believers why are the Gentiles segregated? Ephesians 2:11-14, *"Wherefore remember, that ye being in time past Gentiles in the flesh, who are called Uncircumcision by that which is called the Circumcision in the flesh made by hands; That at that time ye were without Christ, being aliens from the commonwealth of Israel, and strangers from the covenants of promise, having no hope, and without God in the world: But now in Christ Jesus ye who sometimes were far off are made nigh by the blood of Christ. For he is our peace, who hath made both one, and hath broken down the middle wall of partition between us."* John saw a rebuilt end-time temple in Jerusalem. II Thessalonians 2:1-4, *"Now we beseech you, brethren, by the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ, and by our gathering together unto him, That ye be not soon shaken in mind, or be troubled, neither by spirit, nor by word, nor by letter as from us, as that the day of Christ is at hand. Let no man deceive you by any means: for that day shall not come, except there come a falling away first, and that man of sin be revealed, the son of perdition; Who opposeth and exalteth himself above all that is called God, or that is worshipped; so that he as God sitteth in the temple of God, shewing himself that he is God."*

John is instructed to measure the temple, altar, and those who worship in the temple. To measure something means to claim for yourself. The Lord was claiming the temple and those that were worshipping in the temple as His own. Those worshipping are Jews, possibly the 144,000 Jews sealed by God, since the Gentiles saved during the first half of the tribulation are worshipping around the throne of God in heaven.

John is instructed not to measure the court outside of the temple. God is not claiming to own the people or remaining Gentiles who will rule Jerusalem for 42 months (second half of the tribulation). The reason the outer court was not measured is because the image of the beast will be erected and placed in the outer court. Revelation 13:14-15, *"And deceiveth them that dwell on the earth by the means of those miracles which he had power to do in the sight of the beast; saying to them that dwell on the earth, that they should make an image to the beast, which had the wound by a sword, and did live. And he had power to give life unto the image of the beast, that the image of the beast should both speak, and cause that, as many as would not worship the image of the beast should be killed."* Matthew 24:15-16, *"When ye therefore shall see the abomination of desolation, spoken of by Daniel the prophet, stand*

The boy spoke deliberately, as if to remember the exact words: "Unto you is born this day in the city of David a Savior..." "That's here--Bethlehem--David's birthplace," the littlest boy interrupted. He thrust out his chest proudly. "King David was a shepherd, too, you know." The older boy continued. "... which is Christ the Lord." "The Christ, the Messiah . . . He's the one!" The old man pointed to the baby. "The angel was very specific," the young man went on. "and this shall be a sign unto you. You shall find the babe wrapped in swaddling clothes, lying in a manger." He grinned. "How could we miss? We just ran into town and checked every stable until we found you . . . found him." The boy paused. "How many newborns in Bethlehem do you know with a cattle manger for a cradle?"

Joseph chuckled. So that was it. The heavenly Father Himself had provided a bed for His child. A special cradle. A sign to these crude shepherds that God cared for them too. Joseph squeezed Mary's hand very tightly.

in the holy place, (whoso readeth, let him understand:) Then let them which be in Judaea flee into the mountains." This locates the abomination of desolation in Judaea in the Holy Place or temple. In the middle of the tribulation the Antichrist will break his agreement when the image of the beast is placed in the temple court. This will be the signal for the Jews to get out of Judaea and flee into hiding in the mountain because the last half the tribulation is about to begin.

The two witnesses minister during the first half of the tribulation. Their witness is to Israel. They are specially called prophets. Their prophetic ministry involves calling the nation of Israel to repent and return to the true God of Israel. We are not told who the two witnesses are, but they are God's witnesses doing the work of God. God's witnesses are provided

special powers to get the work done. In the middle of the tribulation "the beast" will turn against Israel and begin to persecute the Jews. The two witnesses will not be around to protect Israel causing an anti-Semitic movement to gain control.

The two witnesses, as God's obedient servants will not be martyred until their testimony for God is finished. The beast (Antichrist) wants to take over the temple but will not be able to succeed until the two witnesses are removed. The two witnesses will not be permitted a decent burial. But even in this indecency, they will be used of God to bear witness to mankind on the earth. When the witnesses are removed, people all over the world will rejoice as the news of their death is transmitted all over the world. From a human standpoint Jerusalem is a "great city" but from God's viewpoint Jerusalem, at this time, is polluted and worldly as Sodom was rebellious and as proud as Egypt during the days of Moses.

The bodily resurrection of the two witnesses will take place in the presence of lost people. The resurrection of the two witnesses will be a part of the first resurrection. Revelation 20:6, *"Blessed and holy is he that hath part in the first resurrection: on such the second death hath no power, but they shall be priests of God and of Christ, and shall reign with him a thousand years."* The resurrection and ascension of the two witnesses will cause great fear to those on the earth and they will learn that there is a greater power in the universe than the Beast (Antichrist).

God's Shepherd • A Christmas Story

The frost of forty winters had etched deep lines into the shepherd's face. Having spent his entire life outdoors on Bethlehem's hills, he was old at forty — and cold. The hillside where he sat this day was cold, too, and he pulled his mantle close about him to block the wind.

Every so often he would shift position, not out of discomfort so much, but from a sense of unease, anxiety, crowdedness. Instead of hundreds of sheep with whom he felt quite at home, this hillside was flocked with people — thousands of them — listening attentively to the Teacher. They could hear him fairly well, except when the wind whisked away his words.

Tobias ben David (pronounced da-VEED) was the shepherd's name, though people called him Toby. His flocks were in good hands this week, cared for by his grown sons, but Toby had left them to listen to Jesus of Nazareth. Today the Teacher was talking about salvation, how God came to save his people from their waywardness and sins, to rescue them and gather them close.

Now Jesus' illustration turned to sheep. Toby felt better. He knew a lot more about sheep than people.

"The good shepherd," Jesus was saying, "lays down his life for the sheep. The hired hand who doesn't own the flock runs away when he sees the wolf coming, but not the good shepherd...." One night, years ago, the men Toby had hired to watch the flock with him fled when they saw a mountain lion roaming the hills. But Toby had stayed. Shepherding was his livelihood. He knew the sacrifices that good shepherding required. He knew about defending defenseless lambs. He knew about putting his life on the line for the sheep. That's what good shepherds did.

Jesus continued, "Suppose you have 100 sheep and when night comes one is missing. What do you do? You leave the 99 sheep all safe together and then climb the hills, looking, searching until you find the lost sheep. Then you pick him up, put him on your shoulders, bring him down the hill to the camp, and ask your fellow shepherds to rejoice with you."

"Your heavenly Father is like that," Jesus said. "When you have lost your way, he will rescue you and save you and never give up on you until he finds you — and you find him."

Toby's heart was racing. He felt a lump in his throat.

He understood. Toby had combed the hills for lost sheep, not stopping, not quitting. He knew the joy of discovery, of rescuing the sheep from a thicket, of bringing it back and celebrating with his friends. He had been that kind of shepherd.

But he also knew how it felt to wander off, feeling lost, aimless, trapped. Clueless about where he was and where he was going. Flailing about, struggling to climb out of what seemed like a steep ravine. That's why he came today to hear the Teacher, hoping to regain the faith he had felt as a child, a ten-year-old child.

His mind spun back to the evening of his tenth birthday. Like nearly every night, he was out on the hills with his dad or his uncles, caring for the sheep. The stars were brilliant, dancing in the black sky. But suddenly an overpowering bright light flooded the hillside. A voice boomed out, "Behold, I bring you good news of a great joy which shall be for all the people. For to you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is Christ the Lord!"

A savior, a rescuer — shepherds' work. He had often wondered about the boy-child they discovered that night, lying in a manger, just as the angel had said. Toby had knelt down and worshipped the baby who bore the world's destiny upon his tiny shoulders. What had become of him, this baby? By now he must be thirty-something. Had this savior saved anyone yet? Rescued anyone? Could he rescue me from my aimless existence? Toby wondered.

Just then the wind caught Jesus' words and blew them Toby's direction. "I am the Good Shepherd," Jesus was saying, "who lays down his life for the sheep. Come to me, all you who are weary and heavy laden and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you and learn from me," he said with warmth and joy full on his face, "for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your
