

Meramec Landmark Baptist Association Missionary Committee Meeting Minutes • July 26, 2019

The Missionary Committee of the Meramec Landmark Baptist Association met July 26, 2019 during teen camp at the Meramec Retreat Center in Richwoods, MO.

The meeting was called to order by the moderator, Bro. Brian Meade, and Bro. Mike Jarvis led in prayer.

Bro. Meade recognized the following new pastors to our associated work in attendance: Bro. Josh Wright (New Testament Baptist Church-Sullivan, MO) and Bro. Eddie Paul Oats (Berean Baptist Church-Festus, MO).

The roll call of churches showed that 8 churches were represented by a missionary committeeman.

Minutes from the previous missionary committee meeting of March 2, 2019 were read by the clerk, Bro. Michael Hearst. Motion and second to approve the minutes. Motion approved.

The treasurer's report was given by Bro. Ben Kingston who had been provided with the financial information by treasurer Bro. Johnny Dover. The financial report showed that there was \$184,775.88 in the mission fund and \$58,933.66 in the revolving fund for a total available of \$243,709.54. Motion and second to approve the financial report. Motion approved.

Bro. Mike Jarvis then read the report from the Advisory Committee.

The Advisory Committee made the following recommendations to the Missionary Committee:

1. Recommend that Bro. Johnny Dover be re-elected as treasurer of the Meramec missionary committee/revolving loan fund.

2. Recommend that Bro. Mike Jarvis be elected as assistant treasurer.

3. Recommend that the Meramec association's support of Bro. Jamie Haguewood's participation in the Reaching and Teaching International Ministry (RTIM) be continued for another year with the Meramec association matching up to \$4,800. of offerings made by Meramec churches.

4. Recommend that the Meramec Association institute a school of prophets for pastoral and discipleship training for young, new, and current pastors. Bro. Jamie Haguewood is to be the coordinator and the Meramec Association will budget up to \$ 200. for each training event. (Note: If a church would like to host a training event, they are to contact Bro. Haguewood.)

5. Recommend that Bro. Ben Kingston be given authority to make arrangements for a renewal retreat.

There was a motion and second to adopt these 5 recommendations from the Advisory Committee and send them to the Meramec association churches for consideration at the annual meeting at White Oak Grove Baptist Church September 20, 2019. Motion approved.

Bro. Ben Kingston gave an update on the status of the Meramec Association's partnership with First Baptist Church, Magnolia, Arkansas and Bro. Dustin Wisely's new church planting efforts in Columbia, MO. With the resignation of the senior pastor from First Baptist Church, Magnolia, Arkansas, the timeline to begin this new church planting effort in Missouri may be pushed back.

Bro. Kingston also gave a report from the camp committee. Motion and second to approve the camp report. Motion approved.

Motion and second to adjourn. Motion approved.

Missionary committee was dismissed in prayer lead by Bro. Brian Kingston.



My Tribute To An Exemplary Lady Wanda Flowers 1933 - 2019

So many memories went through my head when I learned of the passing of Sis. Wanda Flowers this week. Almost all of them were connected to Zion and activities associated with Zion. I remembered her driving our family's car, an International Travelall (big green ugly thing!) to church camp with at least 20 kids in it. Well, not really 20, but you can fit a lot more small people (kids) in a vehicle than you can large people, and it seemed like 20! She had a chauffeur's license because she was a school bus driver. So she was equipped not only to drive, but to handle a vehicle full of boisterous kids. And she did it well. I remembered Wanda as one of our kitchen chiefs. As long as we went to Zion, three ladies primarily directed all the meals served for various meetings:

July 4 - Independence Day July 12 - 13 - Missouri GMA Retreat at Camp Garwood July 29 - Aug. 2 - Missouri State Encampment - Camp Garwood

Wanda Flowers, Wilma Finley, and my Mom Lucy Widger. These three ladies were a team that recognized the strengths of each other and they worked very well together for years. It is hard to think of one of them in the church kitchen without thinking of all three of them. They made sure there was plenty for everyone, and nobody ever left a meeting hungry. I know each of them always prepared more than they thought would be needed, because it was unheard of for us to run out of food! In directing this service by our church, they taught observers (the younger women) how to organize and prepare for large crowds. I remembered two particular dishes Wanda prepared which were my favorites; Cole slaw and peach cobbler. I asked for her recipe for Cole slaw and the copy she made attributed the recipe to Elvira Flowers. I used that recipe in a chili supper competition between Zion and Bethany, and I WON for best Cole slaw. I still use it, and I would bet the Flowers family does as well. I wish I had asked for the peach cobbler recipe as well. I remembered her as my GMA (Girls' Missionary Auxiliary) counselor, a position she held for years. She encouraged our young girls to memorize scripture, learn how to study our Bibles, prepare youth programs, and find some kind of service work to participate in. We learned about missionaries and how we could help, no matter how much or how little that help was. She was always prepared to lead us in a lesson that was founded on Biblical principles, which we could use in our daily lives. Wanda had great patience with a bunch of active, giggly

historical site, or see something fun. One trip that stood out and we laughed about a lot was when we took her pickup with the camper and my parents' car. We intended to stop overnight and sleep in the camper. We were going to stop at Hot Springs, Arkansas to see, of course, the hot springs. Somewhere along the trip our time got away from us and we were traveling through Ouachita National Forest in Arkansas as it started to get dark. We were miles from our intended overnight camping stop. I followed the camper, and observed that Wanda could haul out of there when necessary. I watched the back side of that camper sway and bounce and move on down the road. We practically flew through that area to get to I think Texarkana to camp for the night. I didn't know a pickup with a big camper could go so fast! (And we never did see the hot springs, either!) When I think of the word "lady," Wanda is one of the pictures that come to my mind. That and pink. I don't know if pink was her favorite color, but she wore it a lot, and looked very nice in pink! Wanda came from a generation where certain behavior was expected of ladylike women. Courteous, friendly, modest, kind, are all adjectives I think of when I think of Wanda, because this is how she was with people. Being a good hostess was something that was important to Wanda. Around Christmas 2018 Van, Janet and I visited Wanda to take something to her from our ladies group. recently been ill and we didn't want to tire her out. But after settling in, and with the required offering of refreshments, we ended up visiting and talking for a couple hours! I hope she enjoyed the visit; I know we did. I understand the weekly reading club at Wanda's home was great fun for the ladies who participated. I didn't have the opportunity join this group, but I heard about their meetings, and how Wanda always desired to be the best hostess. Wanda was one of the best examples to me of being steadfast in her commitment to Christ and to the work of His church. As a young child, I remember Wanda bringing her boys to church



every time there was a service. We saw them often, because my parents were the same way. Church was first. She was dedicated to seeing that her boys were taught the love of God and Jesus Christ. In the last few years, we were having a conversation about the difficulties of bringing up kids in church, and standing firm in your beliefs about what was important in the face of peer and school competition for your kids. She said people probably had no idea how hard that was for her to do. Leroy wasn't a "churchgoer" although I'm sure he believed in God, so he didn't come to church with Wanda and the boys when they were youngsters. Wanda said it would have been so much easier to just stay home, but she persevered. In later years, we did see a lot of Leroy coming to church with Wanda. I suspect her steadfastness and patience had a lot to do with that. I know Wanda had some health issues. I first heard the word "reflexology" from her. But for the most part, whatever health issues she had did not keep her from doing what was important to her. I think any illness had to be fierce before she allowed it to dictate what she could or could not do. She dealt with arthritis, throat problems, and cancer. She dealt with Leroy's Parkinson disease. I'm sure she had a lot of help from her boys and their families, but she shouldered her burdens as well, dealing with them with dignity. I always felt Wanda exhibited a presence. Not in the way you might think of as "a force to be reckoned with," but someone whom you knew because of certain qualities, such as being steadfast, reliable, dependable, always caring, always willing to help in any way she could. I saw Wanda as being a very supportive person. If she had a life experience that she thought might help you, you received the benefit of that experience.

I will miss her caring, loving presence in my life. I am grateful that she was a part of my life for around 58 years. Ehud Turned Disability into Victory

Judges 3:12-30 by Dennis Baker • BMAMO Brotherhood President

Ehud, the second judge of Israel, is a great encouragement to people with disabilities who have the erroneous idea that God can't use them in His service. Verse fifteen states that Ehud was a Benjamite and that he was left-handed. Lefthandedness seems to have been relatively common among Benjamite's (Judges 20:16). However, references found in the Holman Christian Standard Bible and The Wiesbe Bible Commentary suggest that the meaning may be translated, "hindered in the right hand." This suggest that Ehud's lefthandedness may have been a defect or disability.

Because the Children of Israel did evil in the sight of the Lord. Eglon and his allies made life miserable for the Jews for 18 years. When the children cried out to the Lord, God honored His covenant and provided a deliverer. The deliverer, called by God, appears to be a man with a disability, named Ehud. How could God use a man with a disability to conquer Elgon the King of Moab?

The narrative reflects a literary masterpiece of strategy. There is little available information concerning Ehud's background or training. With God's help, Ehud had several problems to solve before King Elgon's overthrow could be accomplished. How could he gain access to King Elgon without arousing suspicion? How could he secure a private audience with the king without alerting the distrust of the king's attendants or guards? How could he escape without being caught? Finally, how could he rally the troops and attack the enemy?

Ehud was appointed by the people to deliver the annual tribute to the king. The paying of the tribute added to be king's wealth, and also acknowledged the king's authority over Israel. After Ehud paid the tribute, he and his men left the king's presence only to return alone as through he had an urgent message from the Lord. A solitary man with a lame right hand couldn't be much of a threat to a powerful king. King Elgon may have felt proud that the God of Israel had a message for him, and he dismissed his guards and attendants to give Ehud an audience in his private chambers. Since Ehud had to kill Eglon in a way that was quick and quiet, and that would catch the king by surprise he might have made use of his disability. Ehud made a very sharp dagger and hid it under his clothing on his right thigh. Even if the guards did frisk him, they most likely would have examined the left side where most men carried their weapon. The guards may not have examined him at all because of his disability.

As the king stood up to receive the message from the Lord, Ehud reached for the dagger on his right thigh with his left hand and plunged it into the king's belly, killing King Elgon instantly. Ehud escaped by locking the doors of the private chamber which delayed the recovery of the body. As the King's men and attendants observed that the interview was over, they went to see if the king wanted anything. To their surprise the doors were locked. Thinking the king was probably attending to his needs they delayed their entrance to the king's chambers. All this took time allowing Ehud to escape.

After escaping, Ehud gathered the men of Israel together by the fords of the Jordan and assured them that God had delivered the Moabites into their hands. Ehud had excellent soldiers to command and after killing 10,000 of the best Moab soldiers, the control of land was returned to Israel.

If the Jews were given the opportunity to choose a leader, Ehud would have been the last one chosen. However, as God's
