

Even though its origin is questionable, it first appeared in English in the early 16th century and a century later it developed the figurative sense of an overflowing supply.


In I Thessalonians 5:18 we are admonished "In everything give thanks, for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus concerning you."

## 2019 Annual State Meeting

October 12th forty-four messengers from fifteen churches of the BMA of MO gathered in Sikeston for our Annual Association. This meeting was earlier in October than our previous meetings due to Bylaw changes made last year.

Bethel Baptist Church and Pastor Billy Davis were gracious hosts for the Association's 92nd annual meeting. After a morning devotional from John 14:6 by Bro. Troy Sisk, Moderator Ben Kingston called the business meeting to order.

Two churches re-petitioned into membership with the Association – New Testament at Sullivan, and Friendship at Caseyville. We welcome these congregations back into our fellowship.

Messengers approved the recommendations from the Special Missions Committee to amend the Association bylaws related to Associational officers (see September Missouri Missionary Baptist), and to purchase liability insurance for the Association. This policy combines the present insurance for Camp with additional coverage for other areas of the Association. Payment for the new consolidated policy will be divided as follows: 60% paid by Camp, 20% by Missions, and 20% by the Loan Association.

Other missions-related business included sending \$3,000 to the BMAA Seminary (Jacksonville, TX), and continued support for Bro. Matt Barker in Nixa, MO. (Note: Since the meeting Bro. Matt Barker has resigned the work in Nixa.) See article on page 3.

The messengers also approved the Loan Association transferring the interest they receive this year to pay on the Camp Garwood loan. This will amount to approximately \$900.

#### From Our Missions Director & Editor ....

To save space I am combining reports for the two positions I hold to help you understand a little more about what you read in the report on the Annual Association on page 1.

I had served as Assistant Missions Director for a few years when Bro. Danny Kirk was the Director. Following his resignation and move out of state I became the Missions Director in June of 2015. I became Editor of the *Missouri Missionary Baptist Paper* in the spring of 1988 following Bro. Jerome Cooper when he moved to a position with the BMAA Publications Department.

During this past year I have been praying about the need for me to resign these positions and in conferring with the committees of these departments I reached the decision that God wants me to serve through this associational year. Therefore I tendered my resignation of both positions effective September 30, 2020. This plan was accepted by the messengers at the annual meeting last month.

Some may ask, "Why resign so far ahead of the actual date the retirement will take place?" The answer is simply that I might be able to work with those who will be taking the positions (especially that of Editor) so they will be ready to assume their position well prepared October 1, 2020.

The committees are asking those who are interested in applying for either or both positions to turn in a resume to our association Clerk (Page 1) by January 1, 2020 and they hope to have interviews completed and recommendations ready to offer at our mid-year meeting in May 2020. Those elected in May will then learn what they need to know by spending some time with me before my resignation is effective.

If things go as planned, this is going to require some added

expense as we will need to pay some stipend to those who are elected and learning between May and October to help with their expenses in coming to my office to get prepared.

The funds are available for the Missions Director in our Missions Funds, but the MMB is operating on very limited funds and is going to need some help financially.

We will try to address that later.

Pray for God to lead these committees as they search for those who will serve the churches in these departments next year.

Pray for me as I try to wrap things up and serve as a tutor for those who are elected.

These are two very important ministries of our associated work and they both need our cooperation and support. I realize both ministries can use some upgrading with

Thank you for helping support our calling in planting Refuge Church in Nixa, Missouri.

Central Baptist College President Terry Kimbrow has announced that the CBC Board of Trustees has approved a new student discount for the Spring 2020 semester of the PACE program to celebrate the program's 20th Anniversary.

"We have been anticipating the 20th Anniversary of PACE, which stands for Professional Adult College Education and wanted to do something as a way of celebrating this unique program. Offering a 20% discount for the 20th Anniversary of the program in the year 2020 to allow new students to experience PACE seemed like a great fit!" said Kimbrow.

The board approved the following language for the discount: "In commemoration of the 20th anniversary of the PACE Program (January 2020), we approve a 20% tuition discount for all first time entering, transfer, or readmit students to the PACE program for the Spring 2020 semester. This discount would be stackable with any other institutional aid they are eligible to receive."

"So many people have put their dream of obtaining a college degree on hold because they find themselves place-bound, working during the day, caring for a family or facing other obstacles that hinder their ability to go to college," said Dr. Gary McAllister, Vice President of Academic Affairs. "PACE can remove those roadblocks and give adults an opportunity to achieve their dreams. The time to enroll is now!"

Ryan Johnson, Vice President for Enrollment Management said that "the PACE Program began as a non-scholarship program with students being required to pay out of pocket for 100% of program costs. In recent years Central Baptist College has added multiple types of institutional aid available in the PACE program to assist students with covering program costs. This additional 20% discount should further assist students make their dream of beginning or completing a college degree a reality."

In addition to available state and federal financial aid programs, Central Baptist College offers a Veteran's Discount Grant, Ministry Tuition Grant, and BMAA Grant for students who attend a BMAA church. Most recently, the College has started a PACE Business Partner program where area businesses can partner with CBC to offer their employees a 25% tuition discount.

According to McAllister, the initial purpose of the PACE Program was to accommodate the educational needs of adults, which led to the development of a nontraditional program to assist them in completing their education. "Because of the flexible format of the degree completion program, adult learners, who found themselves hindered by a work schedule or other conflicts, could complete a Bachelor of Science Degree in Organizational Management by attending class once a week in

the evening for 18 months." Integration of new technology has further enhanced the flexibility of the program and kept it relevant in an everchanging environment.

"Over the years, PACE has grown," added McAllister. "Although it began with just one degree program, it now offers 12 different degree programs in areas such as Psychology, Human Resource Management, Leadership & Ministry and Management Information Systems. Students can begin these programs with no previous college experience. They also have more flexibility. They can still come to class once a week, if they choose, or they can take advantage of the hybrid and online programs that we offer and complete their degree from home."

To take advantage of the one-time 20% tuition discount, first-time entering, transfer, or readmit students should apply for admission and complete the registration process during the Spring 2020 semester. There are four registration periods (blocks) for the Spring 2020 semester. The application deadline for the first block is December 6 with classes set to begin January 13. The application deadline for the second block is January 24 with classes beginning February 17.

## Food for Thought and Digestion!!

For all the Dear Churches and readers of the Missouri Missionary Baptist paper:

I hope this month's paper finds you doing well. I always desired to write a monthly article, but the months seem to come by every second week these days.

At our state meeting this year I was intrigued by an idea I would like to address just for the sake of argument perhaps, but certainly for clarity on how I believe we should approach church growth.

First, to be clear, this isn't a shot on any level at anyone. I called Bro. Troy Sisk to make sure he knew that this is not a criticism of his devotional. However, it was the devotional that sparked my interest in this article.

The subject is simply this: are our churches still embracing the age-old cliché, "the message never changes but methods always do"?

As I told Bro. Troy, and He agreed, I can't control what any other church or denomination does, but like every pastor, I can certainly have a say in what Bethel does and in what our Association gets involved!

I believe it is vitally important that we as churches stay relevant in our outreach methods to a lost world. As Paul states in 1 Corinthians 9:19-23 (KJV): "For though I be free from all men, yet have I made myself servant unto all, that I might gain the more. And unto the Jews I became as a Jew, that I might gain the Jews; to them that are under the law, as under the law, that I might gain them that are under the law; To them that are without law, as without law, (being not without law to God, but under the law to Christ,) that I might gain them that are without law. To the weak became I as weak, that I might gain the weak: I am made all things to all men, that I might by all means save some. And this I do for the gospel's sake, that I might be partaker thereof with you."

For me, the fear is not what anyone else is doing that may be beyond the pale, but what have we done recently that could be called a 'new method' to reach the lost?

Now, let me quickly share that this can be a very frustrating experience. New doesn't always translate into successful. And just because it worked at Bro. John Doe's Church doesn't mean it will work at the Church I pastor. But with saturating prayer each Church leadership should seek out and be open to new avenues to reach new people for Christ.

Please let me be very clear: I am not accusing anyone in our association of being afraid of change. However, I am asking each church to ask the question: "what can we point to in the last year that we have done that is new to reach someone for Christ as a Church?"

I am not pushing a program, though there are some good ones. I prefer the word 'process.' Every process should involve these three elements when trying to reach the lost:

- 1. Invite your sphere of influence.
- 2. Meet a felt need.
- 3. Share your faith succinctly and sincerely.

May the Lord bless you in your endeavors to reach your world for Christ!

PS. One church growth analyst encourages you to stand in your auditorium and ask this question: "What year is it?"

I can tell you for sure that it is not 2019 decor in the Bethel auditorium. And yes, I hope to practice what I preach.

## Who's at the Door?

How long has that been there? The building or the sign you pass every day but seldom notice. You know what I am talking about. Something that has been right there under your nose, and you haven't even noticed.

I recently began a study that touched the subject of covenant. I read a few commentaries here and there, looked up some

companion verses, learned some things about covenant and something happened — passages once familiar carried a new meaning when I looked at them through eyes of covenant! I started seeing covenant everywhere! I may have to write a book because there is just too much to grasp in 500 words or less.

The dictionary says a covenant is "a formal agreement or contract, a solemn and binding promise between two parties." The contract can be between two equal partners or between a monarch and

his people.

In our sinful society, the one thing we know for sure about promises is they are made to be broken. Even the most airtight, legally binding contract can be negotiated, changed, updated and invalidated. Depending on who negotiated the original contract and who initiated the proceedings, the contract could become worthless and void in no time at all.

The strength of a covenant rests, first and foremost, on the name in which it is introduced and proclaimed under. Every promise of a covenant and every condition of a covenant depends on who make the promises and conditions.

When God spoke to Moses and called him to be the mediator between Himself and the captives in Egypt, He introduced

Himself: "I am the God of your father—the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, the God of Jacob" (Exodus 3:6). Still Moses asked for a name — the name which would be the foundation and the strength of the covenant.

In Bible times, when a man chose a wife, he would go with his father to the bride's family to begin the process of the marriage contract. The first step would be an introduction of sorts. He would knock on the door and when they asked, "Who's there?" the father would state his name and his lineage, his reputation found in the names of his most respected ancestors and their most important contributions to the world. Every promise to follow was staked on his name. "For the Lord will not forsake His people, for His great name's sake..." (I Sam. 12:22).

How many times have I read the phrase "for His name's sake" and not seen the connection? Everything God does is built on His name and the promises He has made. He will do what He promised - not because I deserve anything, but because of His name.

Oh, and remember the father of the prospective groom standing at the door? When he finished introducing himself, he would then announce: "and with me is my beloved son..." and give his name. The name and reputation of the Son rested on the strength of the name of the Father. For the sake of the marriage covenant, they were one and they were coming to make an offer.

God the Father initiates a covenant relationship by knocking on your heart's door. He reveals His right to make the offer based on His name and His character and introduces His beloved Son. Why don't you invite them in and hear them out? You might find an offer you don't want to refuse.

## Application for Thanksgiving From the Book of Psalms

The book of Psalms is a collection of prayers, worship songs, and poems sung and spoke in public worship. They speak of the feelings of the author for himself and his people. Some of the Psalms were written for private worship but were later incorporated into the book for public worship. The individual Psalms were composed over several centuries for use in temple worship as an expression of the history and faith of the people of Israel. It is difficult to determine if the Psalms were originally intended to be used as a hymnbook, but the technical terms found in many of the headings of the canonized book show the Psalms were used regularly in the temple as a hymnbook.

The Psalms of Thanksgiving focus on individual or community crises. While there is disagreement concerning which of the Psalms should be classified as Psalms of Thanksgiving there is some agreement for the components generally

contained in the Psalms of Thanksgiving. Psalms of Thanksgiving usually contain some form that calls for worship, a statement why worship is appropriate, a deliverance from a crisis that causes praise, a vow to praise or make a sacrifice to the Lord, a statement of God's faithfulness, or confession of personal experiences.

The description of the crisis found in Psalms of Thanksgiving varies from detailed to vague, but include dreadful experiences such as being delivered from illness and the prospect of death, spiritual and emotional anguish, hostility and contempt by friends and enemies, banishment from home, and threat of war.

The importance of the

Psalms of Thanksgiving is that they involved the total community, whether among friends and relatives or in formal temple worship. As they shared their personal or community experiences of God's deliverance from crisis, they became a source of inspiration and reason for the individual to believe that God would accomplish personal deliverance in their own life. True worship comes as the individual makes a public witness of God's deliverance and strengthens fellow worshipers by sharing God's grace, Gratitude is being thankful for what God has done and sharing the joy with others.

It is interesting that noisemaking and shouting, Psalms 27:6, 31:11, 33:3; singing and playing of musical instruments Psalms 66:2, 71:22, 100:2; hand-clapping and dancing Psalms 149:3, 150:4 were expressions that the Hebrews used in praise and thanksgiving. The jubilant triumphant, and exuberant nature expressed in worship reflected the joy of God's deliverance from personal or community crisis.

As families and churches celebrate the national holiday of Thanksgiving let's share our personal crisis so they become sources of inspiration and reason to others that God can accomplish deliverance for them. May our reflection of God's deliverance be a call to worship, declaring why worship is appropriate. May our statement of God's faithfulness and a vow to praise the Lord reflect the joy of God's deliverance from personal or community crisis.

### It's Popular to be LGBTQ!

The times have drastically changed. When I was a teenager in South Mississippi in the 80's, it was taboo to talk about the promiscuity of the youth around us or the fact that one of them was "expecting." Today, teens use sexual terms openly in every day conversations, and one thing is abundantly clear in their dialogue — it's very popular to be gay or a lesbian, bi-sexual, transgender or questioning.

Our youth and college students today are facing an unprecedented effort by liberal news agencies, social media and their circle of friends to embrace the LGBTQ movement. They are being indoctrinated by the public on a massive scale, and this effort is invading the local church.

Here in Desoto County in the last month, Gracewood Baptist Church in Southaven ended up on the Memphis news when the pastor refused to marry two lesbians. One of them grew up in the church, and is the daughter of the chairman of deacons at the church. The two went to the media and made it their personal agenda to lambast the church and the pastor. The church has been under attack from without and within.

Saints QB Drew Brees, who is very outspoken about his faith, recently put out a video advising teens to "Bring Your Bible to School" and be open about your faith. Immediately, the LGBTQ group hit the internet saying he was a part of a hate group and was a bigot!

Youth in our church here at Central are taught in the Desoto County school district not to "bully" others, and the teachers have to include in the conversation that they must use sensitivity toward the LGBTQ group and not bully them. This group is steadily growing in our midst.

In our school district it is not an exaggeration to say "It is popular to be LGBTQ!" Any teacher would tell you that.

At school, they hear that they are to use cautious sensitivity; and at church, they hear clear standards and truth from the Word of God. Naturally, the conflict between the two institutions in their minds has to be solved — so there have been a lot of questions from our youth. That's understandable, given the fact that their minds are being loaded with information.

So how do we handle this issue in the context of our churches, and in particular in our youth groups? Let me admit that I

cannot begin to fully address this subject in one article, so my thoughts are not exhaustive, but here are some points:

• We cannot ignore it.

— The LGBTQ movement is motivated to claim our culture. They are passionately pugnacious! Have you noticed? If we ignore it, we will get run over or passed up like an 80-year-old Grandma trying to drive 45 mph through Jackson Metro in a 1978 Ford Fairmont.

No, we have to be as aggressive on this agenda and others like this hot button issue, or our silence will be loudly heard by our youth. We can't afford to be apathetic!

• We cannot simply state from the pulpit that it's wrong. — Should we state that it's wrong? Yes, of course! But this generation craves facts! They are use to a high volume of information from multiple sources at once. They want more than "it's wrong."

As we have stated, they are being saturated by the media with justifications of sin and tolerance. The indoctrination process of the far left is impressive and well-orchestrated. If we only say it is wrong, we come over as simpletons, and they will tend to trust those who seem to be more educated on the issue.

We need to thoroughly and exegetically deal with the issue from the Word of God! It doesn't help the cause to simply get red-faced, spit, holler, wave our handkerchiefs and say it's wrong from the pulpit as the old deacon says, "Amen!"

I know many college students and older teens who appreciate and value informative apologetics! Which leads me to the next point...

• We must be well informed to deal with it. — If we are going to know how to teach our kids, we need to know what they are hearing and being exposed to from the other side. These are three examples of what our teens hear and see out there (there are more, trust me):

One, they are being taught that those who do not agree with the LGBTQ people, are "homophobic." That we (the far right, conservative Christians) actually hate their group. We don't hate them, we disagree with them. The Gospel itself will not allow us to hate those in sin. Our youth need to hear that disagreeing on principles does not translate into hatred.

**Two,** they are being taught that those who are not tolerant are "bigots." In doing so, they have aligned "sexual preference" with racial discrimination. They do so because they are teaching kids that homosexuality is not a choice (like race) but it is hereditary, that there is a "gay" gene in the human race. They also liken the far right with the "Old South" mentality and "backwoods uneducated religion."

Three, the LGBTQ movement has taken Bible passages and fully tried to explain "what God really meant." For example, they say God didn't destroy Sodom and Gomorrah because homosexuality itself was wrong, but because sexual indulgence with multiple partners was wrong and this was rampant in those cities. They further say that God is okay with a monogamous homosexual relationship.

There are multiple sources on the internet which "dismantle traditional viewpoints" of Bible passages that teach against homosexuality. Of course, we know their interpretations are erroneous!

All of this and more is out there... so get informed and be ready to give an answer!
