December 2, Typhoon Kammuri brought damaging winds and heavy rain to the Philippines after making landfall in the Bicol region, about 240 miles southeast of Manila. The Category 4 storm affected approximately 250 families from BMA Philippines churches in that region. Wides p r e a d power outages have displaced storm victims and resulted in a lack of work that is affecting their livelihoods.

BMA Philippines and local BMA churches in Bicol are helping coordinate and carry out the response to the affected area. If you would

From Our Director...

Happy New Year from Mary and I. Thank you for allowing me to serve you in this capacity.

The time for receiving applications for a new Missions Director and a new Editor is now passed. I do not know who has applied for either position, but I ask you to pray for the Special Missions Committee and the Publications Committee as they interview applicants and seek God's leadership in making recommendations to the Association at our mid-year meeting to fill these positions.

Explanation of Insurance Expenditure in this month's Missions financial report. In our annual meeting in October, 2019, the messengers approved a recommendation from the Special Missions Committee to combine the Camp Insurance with the other liability policy we were carrying for the As-

sociation. This consolidation would reduce the overall cost of the two policies and the cost of the insurance would be shared among three of our entities in the following proportions: the Camp Ministry 60%, the Loan Association 20%, and Missions 20%.

When I contacted our insurance agent he told me that they would work on the consolidated policies and send us a bill for what we owed. It wasn't as smooth a transition as we thought and we had to pay some partial payments to keep our insurance in effect during the transition and when it was completed we had to pay the total premium for a year (as we agreed to make an annual payment) and there would be a reimbursement coming in a few weeks for the excess we paid. This was just a couple weeks ago and the financial report shows the total we paid out in December, but we are still

waiting on the reimbursement from the insurance company.

Bro. Baker and Bro. Polk have been very cooperative during this transition and are ready to reimburse Missions for their part just as soon as we know for sure what that will be. Hopefully we will be able have everything straightened out by our next report.

The total premium for the consolidated policies should be between \$9,000 and \$10,000 annually and the overall coverage is better than what we previously had.

It is time to make plans for our **Annual Missions**Symposium which will be May 15, 2020 at New Testament, Sullivan. The next day, May 16th is the **Mid-year**meeting at New Testament. The **Annual meeting** will be October 10, 2020 at Zion, St.

ChangeMakers in Bolivia

BMA ChangeMakers are all "cut from the same cloth"

What they have in common is a dedication to and passion for church planting and discipleship that has changed countless lives. Their mission is pointing people to the cross of Jesus Christ, and they can be found all over the world speaking hundreds of languages in forty percent of the world's 196 countries.

Just ask Bro. Buddy Johnson, long time BMA missionary to Mexico and DCPI (Dynamic Church Planting International) trainer. He has the same passion, and he knows and has literally walked alongside countless ChangeMakers through the years.

Bro. Buddy has been profoundly affected by their ministries and loves to tell their stories. Like the story of Regino Acuña Cossio:

Bro. Acuña is a Bolivian ChangeMaker now ministering, along with his family, in Paraguay. For Bro. "Nino," as he is called, it all began in 1969 when he was eleven years old. At a BMA youth camp, a local pastor, Roger Aguirre, preached

a message that prompted his salvation. Bro. Jerry Kidd was a missionary in Bolivia at the time, and he began mentoring young Regino. Later, Brothers Marvin Loyd, Larry Hendren and Jimmy Swindoll were his co-workers and further prepared him for mission work. What a powerhouse of men to learn from and be discipled by!

In the years that followed, Bro. Nino became the director of the Bolivia Bible Institute after the death of Swindoll. In addition, he coordinated pastors' conferences, marriage conferences, church planter training, and other meetings and events. Johnson describes him as "a humble, hard-working

preacher who has a passion for our Lord's kingdom work. His wife Celia and their three children are also quiet, humble believers."

In 2010, God began to stir Bro. Nino's heart toward the country of Paraguay. Bro. Nino shared this burden with Bro. Buddy and other Bolivian pastors, and in 2013, after much prayer, BMA mission work in Paraguay became a reality.

Bolivia no longer has American missionaries, but there are indigenous BMA personnel in the ChangeMakers who continue to plant churches there. And it all began through the calling of an indigenous pastor, Bro. Nino, to serve his people group in both Bolivia and Paraguay.

The "cloth" that he and other ChangeMakers have been cut from has become a beautiful tapestry since 1950 when the Baptist Missionary Association was born. Seventy years of steadfast global mission work has produced so many ChangeMakers that it is almost impossible to count.

World Missions Day is dedicated to these faithful servants whose faces you will likely never see, but who are the lifeblood of BMA Global Missions. Why Do the Righteous Suffer While the Ungodly Seem to Prosper?

Psalm 73:1-28

It is believed that Asaph, a Levite who served as a musician and worship leader in the sanctuary during David's reign, is the writer. Asaph was dealing with the age-old problem of, "Why do the righteous suffer while the ungodly seem to proper." As a worship leader Asaph struggled with the question of how he could lead the people in divine worship if he had questions concerning the ways of the Lord. The psalmist shares his story of how worship helped him to find answers with his struggles with envy, doubts, and his faith in God. Through his struggles, Asaph learned to trust in God.

Asaph's description of his crisis of faith began with a basic element of biblical theology, "God is good to Israel" but then he confesses that he almost stumbled when he became envious of the success and wealth of the wicked. The phrase "a clean heart" helps us understand that he was certain that the God he worshipped was good. The phrase "a clean heart" shows that he understood that in his heart he was committed to the Lord, but he was not sinless.

As Asaph meditated on the subject the more he began to slip from his foundation of faith. There is a difference between doubt and unbelief. Doubt comes from a struggling mind, while unbelief comes from a stubborn will that refuses to surrender to God. As Asaph reflected on his envy of the ungodly, he was committing an act of disobedience. Psalm 37:1. "Fret not thyself because of evildoers, neither be thou envious against the workers of iniquity."

From Asaph's viewpoint, the ungodly had it made. Their attitude and actions seemed to place no restriction upon them. They were proud of their wealth and situation in life. He was troubled at their view of God's characteristics. He was bothered by the arrogant behavior of the wicked. They frequently spoke words of opposition against God.

Based on the evidence, Asaph was moving to the wrong conclusion that he had wasted his time and energy maintaining a clean and a pure heart, V 13. Asaph almost bought into a commercial philosophy that the life of faith encourages us to serve God for what we can get out of it.

Before changing his philosophy, Asaph paused to consider the consequences. How would the next generation respond if a sanctuary worship leader turned his back on God? To abandon the faith would undermine all that he had taught and sung in the sanctuary. The more he though on the problem his heart hurt. He decided to go to the sanctuary and spend time with the Lord in worship, there he would be with other worshippers, hear the Word and songs of praise. Worship helped him see the things of the world in different perspective.

Asaph realized that what he saw in the lives of the ungodly was not a true picture. God can and does give success and wealth to dedicated believers, however the dreams of the ungodly will one day turn into a nightmare. Asaph was humbled before the Lord and regained his spiritual balance.

When Asaph stated that "Truly God is good to Israel" in verse one, he may not have been sure what the word "good" meant. Is it wealth, authority, and pleasure? The ungodly have everything they want and need. The possession of the ungodly are idols that take the place of the Lord. But God's people, even in death, cannot be separated from God's blessings.

The psalm ends with Asaph getting his feet firmly grounded on faith. When he left the sanctuary, he told everybody what he had learned. He had drawn near to God, he had trusted God, and now he was ready to declare God's works.

From God's Word & My Heart

Dear churches: I would like to discuss a subject that should be at the top of all our New Years resolutions and **that is to get me a present next year!** Opps!! No! no! no! That was a written Freudian slip!

Seriously now, a subject that should be on the top of all our New Years resolutions is to **eradicate all bitterness** from our lives this year.

You are aware, of course, of the Bible verse, "Looking carefully lest anyone fall short of the grace of God; lest any root of bitterness springing up cause trouble, and by this many become defiled;" Hebrews 12:15. And this one "Let no corrupt communication proceed out of your mouth, but that which is good to the use of edifying, that it may minister grace unto the hearers. And grieve not the holy Spirit of God, whereby ye are sealed unto the day of redemption. Let all bitterness, and wrath, and anger, and clamor, and evil speaking, be put away from you, with all malice:" Ephesians 4:29-31.

"And be ye kind one to another, tenderhearted, forgiving one another, even as God for Christ's sake hath forgiven you." Ephesians 4:32.

The first time I heard anyone preach on this that I remember was Kenneth Bobo, A revivalist that wandered the south back in the 70's and the 80's and boy, could he preach! His raspy belabored voice was enough to keep you awake, but His message was even more inspiring. He had a three message series on "Bitterness," and that series has spared me from many sleepless nights.

Simply put, I struggle with bitterness on a daily basis but because of God's Word I have a simple but powerful and effective way to overcome it every time it comes knocking.

We can't ever forget that we have a three-fold attack against us daily: the onslaught of the devil, the conformation of the world, and the deceitfulness of our flesh.

Bitterness is that awful desire to see those that hurt us pay in pain for a lengthy time, but since many times there is little we can do about it we are the only ones that end up hurting.

Truths about bitterness:

It is a sin.

It hurts us more than we are hurting those who make us bitter. It paralyzes growth and stifles effectiveness.

Our focus is on that person and many times we become like them because of our laser focus on them.

We spoil other people on them.

We are acting the opposite of how Christ wants us to act.

You grit your teeth more.

You fall in love with your hate.

Your hate spoils the good relationships in your life.

You become increasingly negative.

You become an energy taker not an energy giver.

You become increasingly lonely because it's all you talk about therefore people begin avoiding you.

Well, have I made my point that bitterness is one of the worst and most common pitfalls the devil sets for God's children?

Ready for the cure?

Know the truth and the truth shall set you free.

"For we wrestle not against flesh and blood, but against principalities, against powers, against the rulers of the darkness of this world, against spiritual wickedness in high places." Ephesians 6:12

The person that hurt you and that you now are bitter towards is not the problem.

We wrestle not against flesh and blood.

The problem is the attack of the devil.

We have all had difficulties with human beings because we

The devil, the world's system, and our flesh is the problem and we must quit fighting each other and fight the real enemy.

"Choose you this day" is the cry from these pages. "Choose whom you will serve" is the demanding statement of Joshua 24:15. The people of that era answered and said "God forbid that we should forsake the Lord, to serve other gods"...verse 16. Moral choices then is the cry confronting 2020 Christian believers and church congregations.

The So-Called Celebration of Modern Music and Media

Coming out of the 1960's, 1970's and 1980's a small group of dissidents spread vulgarity (curse words) and sexual slang and that began to spread this type of vulgarity in music and media until 2020 it has became the norm.

Just like flood waters and devastating fires will change the physical environment, this heavy storm of immoral words and sexual immoral slang has and is sweeping the American land-scape. It is rapidly changing college, school, church, and home life. The ugly, vile, and lack of tactful words confronts our Christian children; so may we parents, grandparents, teachers, and preachers employ wholesome words. We can help stop this escalating breakdown. We (all) know of these words, without calling them in this forum.

American political commentator Joe Klein gave an analysis of the decline of moral values in America: "It is impossible, of course, to pinpoint the precise moment when moral relativism became acceptable public policy – but in the sixties, the structures of moral authority were systematically removed from the poorest neighborhoods. A series of legal judgments made it harder for teachers to discipline their students and for housing projects to screen their tenants; the cop on the beat was seen as an occupying force and removed. The moral consequences of programs like welfare were never considered. Instead of nurturing virtue, popular culture celebrated intemperance—and intemperance, pointed out 200 years ago, may addle the rich, but it devastates the poor.

The enormous costs brought about by this conflict have brought great hardship and compounded the problem for those involved in intervention and rescue."

The Analysis of Those Who Support this Moral Downfall

Jeremiah 2:9 "Wherefore I will yet plead with you, saith the Lord, and with your children's children will I plead"...2:11 "Hath a nation (America-my emphasis) changed their God's, which are yet no gods? But my people have changed their glory for that which doth not profit."

Simply recognizing the source of moral downfall that motivates the other side will not give Christian churches and its people victory in the culture wars, but it is an essential first step in preparing for the battle. The first task in any conflict is to "know your enemy," and as we come to understand the forces that are arrayed against us, and as we recognize the trail of disaster in their wake, we will be better prepared to make our voices heard and to make a real and lasting difference for the kingdom of God.

Today's world, especially America and the Western world, is turning away from God and desiring to eliminate His name. Most churches in Europe, Australia, and America are empty. Belgium, Denmark, Holland, Spain, Great Britain, and Canada have all legalized same-sex marriage or same-sex unions. So many of these countries have become not only non-Christian but in many areas actually anti-Christian.

"Many elements in the U.S. are hard at work both covertly and openly for the total secularization and paganization of America "according to the late Adrian Rogers. One such group that we identify with the downfall of morals is the A.C.L.U. (American Civil Liberties Union). They are working to tear down the Godly and moral foundation of America. They are just one of many such organizations.

Here are some official A.C.L.U. policy positions. They support:

- 1. legalized child pornography,
- 2. partial birth abortions,
- 3. legalized prostitution,
- 4. adoption by lesbians/homosexuals,
- 5. publicly funded profane art,
- 6. legalized polygamy,
- 7. they oppose legalized school prayer,

- 9. A.C.L.U. opposes Christian home schooling and on and on in the moral and spiritual downfall.

May we born-again believers in Christ approach heaven with prayers for the churches and members who desire a godly life. The A.C.L.U.'s major goal is a tolerant secularized USA. where religious speech is not only silenced but punished.
