Missionary Care -A Priority and Personal Ministry

The 2016 Asia-Pacific Missionary Care Conference in San Pablo, Philippines, was held February 5-9. Seven countries were represented by forty-four missionaries and their families: Burma-Myint and Mal Aung, Rama and Lahlmu Bochung; Cambodia-John and Louela Page; China-Dar Li, the Johnsons, the Andersons, Jojo, Radarlyn, RJ, DJ, and Jaja Vallejera; India-Jeremiah, Abigail, Evan and Ethan Shetti; Prashant, Golda, Joanna and Jason Prakash; Laos-Joy Vargas; Philippines-Danny and Rita Ballard; Sam, Dawn, Tristan, Zane, and Seth Freeman; Fil, Lisa, and Justine Kakilala; Doug and Diane Lee; Doyle Moore; Vincent and Maraya Ferrer; Thailand-Brandon, Brittney, and Josie Lingle.

According to Assistant Director Sarah Hamilton, the mission statement of BMA Missionary Care "is ongoing preparation, equipping and ministry to missionary personnel so they may be fruitful in life and ministry."

Sarah explained that "Missionary Care Conferences fulfill that mission statement through gospel worship, teaching and fellowship. During worship time, missionaries had a chance to revel in the beauty of the gospel and respond in praise. Gospel teaching from God's Word emphasized prayer, life matters, field ministry, effective communication and family worship. Lastly, gospel fellowship was enjoyed when brothers and sisters of the body of Christ encouraged each oth-

er, prayed for one another and shared what it is to live out the gospel in a foreign land. Each aspect of the conference is intended to help them see and savor Jesus who is the center of the gospel, because he is the Good News that they first embraced and now gladly share with the nations."

The four night, five-day event took place at the Rizal ReCreation Center, a Christian campground and conference center, and began with a "Get to Know You" session followed by a message on the theme of "Prayer," which was continued each of the remaining three nights. Each morning there were breakout sessions and each afternoon included free time, giving missionaries a chance to get to know each other, the counselors in attendance, BMA staff members and lay leaders.

Director Jerry Kidd said, "Our prayer is that we can encourage and strengthen missionaries so they can spread the gospel as effectively as possible, to as many as possible, for as long as possible. Conference attendees told us they weren't sure at first about the conference, but once it was over, they realized it was exactly what their entire family needed. Another attendee commented, 'Before the meeting, I didn't realize that I was so dry spiritually. The preaching, teaching and singing truly renewed my spirit.' When I asked the children what they enjoyed the most, one of them replied, 'the kids' Bible study."

ministry. You're a vital part of our ministry so I wanted to also encourage you with this reflection. Our ministry is encouraging, coaching and training other leaders. The only way I know to see if this is being successful or not is to look at the ministries of those we are ministering to. Not everything we tried to do this past year has been successful, but through God's help, your prayers and a lot of work on the part of those we minister to, God has done great things here.

In 2015 two different ministries to children and youth were started. The first is a children's program in Bienvenido. They meet in the carport of the parsonage below the church. They have packed out the little carport and just bought about 40 more chairs, because more kids are still coming. Updates Concerning the BMAA Meeting in Gatlinburg, Tennessee

Larnelle Harris to Perform at BMAA National Meeting in Gatlinburg

Legendary vocalist Larnelle Harris will perform at 3 p.m. on Wednesday, April 27, at the BMAA National meeting in Gatlinburg, Tennessee. BMAA president Jason Aultman explains, "I believe our people will be blessed and encouraged by Larnelle's powerful voice and inspirational ministry."

The only person in history to be a member of the Gospel Music Hall of Fame, the Amateur Radio Hall of Fame and the Kentucky Music Hall of Fame, Larnelle Harris is admired by fans and peers alike for his majestic tenor voice. Larnelle has become the epitome of talent and integrity in a career that spans over three decades and includes numerous accolades for his music including five Grammy Awards, eleven Dove Awards (three of which were for Male Vocalist of the Year), and a Stellar Award among other honors. He has garnered nineteen #1 radio singles and countless top ten hits. Songs such as "How Excellent Is Thy Name," "I Miss My Time with You," "I've Just Seen Jesus," plus many others including his signature song, "Amen" are now considered modern classics.

From the White House to the danger zone of the Thirtyeighth Parallel, Larnelle has impacted audiences across the globe with his music and ministry. He was the first Christian artist to perform inside the Kremlin after the fall of the Soviet Union. He is one of a handful of celebrities to receive the Ad Council's Silver Bell Award for Distinguished Public Service in recognition of his song "Mighty Spirit" as the theme song for the longest-running Public Service Announcement in television history. Larnelle was recently honored by his home state of Kentucky with the Governor's Lifetime Achievement Award in the Arts, making him the first Christian artist to receive the honor.

Larnelle continues to tour worldwide, with recent dates at Carnegie Hall and in Paris, France. He performed for the National Day of Prayer event in Washington D.C. in May of 2015 and will sing for the United Nations Ambassadors later in the fall. In addition to his numerous solo dates, Larnelle also travels with various multi-artist tours including this fall's Compassion International Savior Tour, the Gaither Homecoming tour, the God of All Glory tour, and the Sandi Patty & Friends tour, the latter of which CCM Magazine reviewed and described Harris as having a "larger-than-life stage presence with impeccable vocal prowess."

Christ is Preeminent Let No Man Rob You of Your Reward by Dennis Baker, Brotherhood President

"Let no man beguile you of your reward in a voluntary humility and worshipping of angels, intruding into those things which hath not seen, vainly puffed up by his fleshly mind, And not holding the Head, from which all the body by joints and bands having nourishment ministered, and knit together, increaseth with the increase of God." Colossians 2:18-19

The word "beguile" means to declare unworthy of a prize. It is an athletic term: the umpire disqualifies the contestant because he has not obeyed the rules. The contestant does not cease to be a citizen of the land, but he forfeits the honor of winning the prize. A believer who fails to obey God's directions does not lose his salvation. But he does lose the approval of the Lord and rewards He has promised to those who are faithful. 1 Corinthians 3:5-8, "Who then is Paul, and who is Apollos, but ministers by whom ye believed, even as the Lord gave to every man? I have planted, Apollos watered; but God gave the increase. So then neither is he that planteth any thing, neither he that watereth; but God that giveth the increase." Now he that planteth and he that watereth are one: and every man shall receive his own reward according tohis own labor ... " Most believers probably serve the Lord out of love and devotion and never think about rewards. Just as there will be degrees of punishment in hell; so will there be degrees of glory in heaven-even though all believers will be like Christ in their glorified bodies. Matthew 23:14, "Woe unto you, scribes and Pharisees, hypocrites! For ye devour widows' houses, and for a pretence make long prayer: therefore ye shall receive the greater damnation," The Puritan Thomas Watson said it perfectly; "Though every vessel of mercy shall be full [in heaven], yet one may hold more than another."

Paul was concerned that accepting the teaching of the false teachers would rob the believers in Colosse of their rewards. The false teachers bypassed the Word of God and the Holy Spirit, teaching that a person could have an immediate experience with the spiritual world through visions and contact with angels. The word "intruding" refers to the mystical religions of Paul's day. It means to "set foot in the inner shrine, to be fully initiated into the mysteries of the religion." No Christian has to go through any initiation ceremony to get into the presence of God. Hebrews 4:14-16, "Seeing then that we have a great high priest, that is passed into the heavens, Jesus the Son of God, let us hold fast our profession. For we have not an high priest which cannot be touched with the feeling of our infirmities; but was in all points tempted like as we are, yet without sin. Let us therefore come boldly unto the throne of grace, that we may obtain mercy, and find grace to help in time of need."

The mystical teachings were wrapped up in pride and false humility. The Gnostic taught that "I am not good enough to come directly to God, so I will start with one of the angels." Trying to reach God through anyone other than Jesus Christ is idolatry. The person who worships through angels or saints now in heaven does not prove their humility for they are not submitting to the authority of God's Word. John 14:6, "Jesus saith unto him, I am the way, the truth, and the life: no man cometh unto the Father, but by me." 1 Timothy 2:5-6, "For there is one God, and one mediator between God and men, the man Christ Jesus; Who gave himself a ransom for all, to be testified in due time."



The teaching of the Gnostic teachers was a substitute for true spiritual nourishment from the head of the church, Jesus Christ. Believers become weak when they do not draw on the spiritual nourishment that comes from Jesus Christ and other believers. The false teachers were anxious to win converts to their cause, but the spiritual body grows by nutrition, not by additions. Every member of the church is important to the health and growth of the church. No matter what your spiritual gift may be, you are important to the growth of the church. Some people who may not have spectacular public ministries are just as important behind the scenes as those out in the public.

Through worship, prayer, and the Word of God we draw on the spiritual resources of Christ. Every believer needs to be part of a local church were he can exercise his own spiritual gifts. Ephesians 4:11-17, "And he gave some, apostles; and some, prophets; and some, evangelists; and some, pastors and teachers; For the perfecting of the saints, for the work of the ministry, for the edifying of the body of Christ: Till we all come in the unity of the faith, and of the knowledge of the Son of God, unto a perfect man, unto the measure of the stature of the fulness of Christ: That we henceforth be no more children, tossed to and fro, and carried about with every wind of doctrine, by the sleight of men, and cunning craftiness, whereby they lie in wait to deceive; But speaking the truth in love, may grow up into him in all things, which is the head, even Christ: From whom the whole body fitly joined together and compacted by that which every joint supplieth, according to the effectual working in the measure of every part, maketh increase of the body unto the edifying of itself in love. This I say therefore, and testify in the Lord, that ye henceforth walk not as other Gentiles walk, in the vanity of their mind."

The false teachers in Colosse tried to introduce their false teaching into the local church. If they had succeeded they would have caused the spiritual nourishment of the church to decrease instead of increase. Unless the members of the local church abide in Christ, yield to the Spirit, and obey the Word they cannot experience increase in their Spiritual life. There is a fascination with "religious mysticism" that attracts people. Learning mysteries, being initiated into inner secrets, and having contact with the spirit world seems exciting. However, these practices are condemned in the Word of God. The true Christian glories in Jesus Christ and not his own experience. The true believer follows the Word of God and is led by the Holy Spirit. He seeks no other experience than that which relates to his relationship with Jesus Christ.

Rare Torah Donated to BMA Seminary

The Baptist Missionary Association Theological Seminary hosted its 2016 spring lectures on Tuesday, February 11 at its main campus in Jacksonville, Texas.

The multi-faceted event included two formal lectures, an exhibit of ancient biblical scrolls, and the dedication of a rare 18th Century Ashkenazi Torah that was donated to BMA Seminary's Jacksonville campus by Ken and Barbara Larson.

Dr. Scott Carroll presented lectures on traditions and actual practices related to the creation of scrolls. Carroll, renowned expert on Ancient Biblical Manuscripts, earned a Ph.D. in Ancient History from Miami University and an M.A. in Christian Backgrounds and Early Christianity from the Trinity Evangelical Divinity School.

Scrolls displayed in the exhibit included one of only five complete Isaiah scrolls that date after the Dead Sea Scrolls. Researchers concluded that each scroll displayed in the exhibit had survived threats from Nazis during the Holocaust.

The Larsons have placed retired Torahs in selected evangelical seminaries for almost two years. The dedication of this 18th Century Torah to the seminary added to the Larsons' October 2015 gift of a 19th Century Torah donated to the BMA Seminary Arkansas Site.

During the dedication, the seminary announced the naming of the Torah: the Dr. James C. Blaylock Sefer Torah. The seminary's faculty chose the name in recognition of Dr. James C. Blaylock's work in keeping records and archives for the Baptist Missionary Association and particularly for his fifty years of service to the institution's Kellar Memorial Library. Blaylock also formerly served the BMAA as director of the Baptist News Service.

The scroll will be used as an educational resource for BMATS students and faculty.

Serving others and having a ministry of helping others should be a priority. Matthew 25:40. Demonstrating unconditional love towards others. Practicing unconditional forgiveness. Even little things like meal times together, hugs, hand holding, showing affection. Doing fun things together or working together around the yard, or home is spending time together. A walk is together time. Going to your child's ball game is not. The child is on the field, and you are in the bleachers. That is separation, not together time.

Developing healthy friendships and investing in relationships with time and effort and thoughtfulness should be a priority. Obviously,

Jesus is the number one priority and if you follow Him, then all the other things will be right.

Evaluate your priorities in life. Write them down. Then, pursue them. Life is too short to waste it. Focus on the important stuff and don't be consumed with the little things that eat away your time. Love deeply. Laugh often. Live victoriously. Help others. Enjoy time with Jesus and enjoy this life He has given you!
