WMA Mission Story...

What God Can Do In Less Than 20 Years!

In 1995, I sat in a Writers' Conference and heard Bro. Larry Silvey tell about his trip to Ghana and their use of our used quarterlies of English Sunday School literature as well as their organization into the BMA of Africa. Their zeal inspired me. Ray Loven was the first BMA missionary on the field, before he had to leave for health reasons. The Paul Heuermann family also served for a few years before returning to the states in

John and Margaret Lindsey arrived in September of 1997 and are still serving part-time today. Margaret and John are currently in the states to care for her 97-year-old mother. Bro. John goes over to Africa several times a year to check on things. He does some training while there. In this manner, the African leaders are becoming more responsible for their work, just as in other countries where American missionaries have returned to the states.

The English literature was one of the foundational tools for spreading and teaching the truth of God's Word. Every one of the BMA churches there receive the literature at no charge. It helps tremendously with the spiritual growth of their members. Many Africans—even those not involved with the BMA of Africa—stand in line for hours to receive one of the books when a shipment arrives. The chance to get to understand the Word of God better is a precious commodity to them. As a former writer for Baptist Publishing House (DiscipleGuide), I have received many letters and e-mails from all over Africa thanking me for the literature. Many other writers have as well.

The BMA of Africa has about 170 churches and missions in Ghana, with an additional 70 or so in other African nations. The field is dynamic and constantly changing. However, it is a strong work and growing larger. In fact, the nation of Burkina Faso sent African missionaries to both the Republic of Congo and to Niger recently. Thousands of souls come to know the Lord each year on the continent of Africa through the efforts of our BMA workers allowing God to lead them.

In Ghana, new missionaries and church workers are trained in the Bible Institute. Dale and Celia Broom operate the Institute as well as help with the "Water for Christ" ministry. This ministry is led by Tim Tyler in Conway, Arkansas. Contributions from BMA churches fund the ministry. This ministry works with the leaders of the BMA of Africa to bring souls to Christ and into the BMA churches in Ghana. They drill fresh water wells in villages. Through that simple act, not only do the people have better, healthier lives, they also feel the love of Christ shared with them from perfect strangers.

Our missionaries are trained to use Chronological Bible Stories to help the Africans who cannot or will not read. The missionary tells and teaches the stories to the Christians there. Then they in turn learn it well enough to share it with someone else. And the cycle continues. Sometimes they even make up songs using the story so that they may sing as they work and remember the story better. In this way, they have a "Bible" built into their memories.

Please pray for our work in all of Africa. Besides our American missionaries, there are many national missionaries who carry on God's work. Not only do they need our prayers for spiritual guidance, they also need prayers for physical and health reasons.

We do have churches in Liberia, Sierra Leone and Guinea, where the Ebola outbreak is the strongest. BMA of America has sent "relief funds" to help them out. Thank you for your

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Evangelizng My Son by Scott Attebery

Why I'm Concerned About

I have a parenting struggle to confess. I am uncomfortable about my young child being asked if he would like to make a decision to trust Christ as his Savior and Lord.

Please, don't label me a heretic just yet. This is a real issue that I imagine other Christian parents have dealt with and I am hoping to generate some helpful conversation on the subject.

First, let me clarify my position:

- I ABSOLUTELY want my son to be saved "by grace... through faith" (Ephesians 2:8).
- That, I believe should be manifest by a profession of faith in Christ (Romans 10:9-13).
- Which is in response to the presentation of the gospel (Romans 10:14-17).

Now here is where my concern lies. As a former pastor, I have spent time counseling people who made a profession of faith as a young child and then, later in life, struggled with assurance of salvation. While I fully acknowledge that struggling with assurance is not unique to people who make professions at an early age, it does seem to be more common than not.

Of course, when a person struggles with assurance of salvation from an early profession of faith, there are two possibilities: 1) the person IS saved or 2) the person IS NOT saved.

Those who are saved may struggle because they have difficulty recalling their state of mind at the point of their conversion. Those who are not saved may share the same struggle, or come to realize that their life is not bearing the fruit in keeping with repentance (Matthew 3:8).

That leads me to my concern: I want to guard my son, as best as I can, from making a false profession of faith.

I admit up front, that I do not have control of my son's heart and that I cannot prevent him from making a false profession. For that matter, I can't make him place faith in Christ either.

However, in the same way that I am intentional about how he hears the gospel, I want to be intentional about how he doesn't hear the gospel. I'm not trying to be a control freak; I'm just trying to be responsible.

My son's heart is a precious treasure of which I have been given stewardship. For that reason, I want to guard his heart -not from the gospel- but from a non-age-appropriate presentation of the gospel.

However, that begs a lot of questions that I cannot answer with objective facts. Rather, these questions require prayerful wisdom and insight. For instance, at what age will my son be able to adequately understand the gospel and place faith in Christ? Certainly it is different with every child –but how will I know? What a massive responsibility!

This leads to questions regarding children's ministries, vacation Bible schools, camps, etc. Shouldn't the leaders communicate to the parents how they will and won't share the gospel with children under their care? For that matter, shouldn't parents be asking? How would a ministry set such guidelines in the first place if all children mature at different rates?

I certainly don't have all the answers. And perhaps I'm an over-protective parent. But when it comes to my son's standing before God, I would rather err on the side of caution. So,

Willing

O Lord, help me to be willing -To receive what Thou givest, To lack what Thou withholdest, To relinquish what Thou takest, To surrender what Thou claimist, To suffer what Thou ordainest, To do what Thou commandest, To wait until Thou sayest "Come." here are a few ideas that have been rolling around in my head on the subject:

- 1) It's never too early to share the gospel. The issue lies in how you share it. I try to be very intentional about sharing the good news in the way most appropriate for my son at the given time. I believe that learning the gospel through repetition over time is valuable and helps assure that my child understands concepts fully as the sharing increases in detail.
- 2) I do not want to give my son false assurance. If my son (at an early age) makes a profession of faith in Christ, I would rather respond by saying, "I'm so thankful that you have taken steps toward Christ" rather than "Congratulations, you are saved now!" If he is saved, he certainly isn't going to be unsaved by my hesitancy to give him false assurance. On the other hand, if he isn't saved, yet I claim that he is, I am adding to his confusion and struggle later in life.
- 3) Because of that, I believe that as a parent, not only does responsibility of evangelizing my son belong to me, but the responsibility of guarding my son from non-age appropriate evangelism belongs to me as well. Non-appropriate evangelism would include things like overly persuasive language, pressuring for a decision, assuming knowledge that the child does not possess, etc.
- I know there must be a lot of insights and questions I am missing here. So, assuming you don't think I'm a heretic, would you share your thoughts?
- What have you learned from your experience as a Christian parent?
- How are you guiding the conversation in order to avoid false professions while inviting dialogue?
- · Has your church's children's ministry ever discussed this issue with you?

"Earnestly Contending"

Beloved, when I gave all diligence to write unto you of the common salvation, it was needful for me to write unto you, and exhort you that ve should earnestly contend for the faith which was once delivered unto the saints. Jude verse 3 (KJV)

"I don't believe Jesus really died on the cross; He merely passed out or went into a coma for a while and then revived."

"It does not matter if someone was baptized in a Pentecostal or even a Church of Christ; if they want to join our Baptist church, we should not require them to be re-baptized."

"Any Christian can baptize a new believer whenever it is convenient; church authority in the ordinances is not re-

These statements, if heard by a BMA pastor, deacon, or Sunday School teacher, would take them aback (I hope). I heard them and I was taken aback because I heard them in the context of BMA churches in the last 12 months. For several generations Baptists in general have been described as being "a mile wide and an inch deep." Having heard the quotes above and taught new preachers for almost 20 years, I am convinced that the "inch" evaluation is true.

One might make that observation and despair, but I find the opportunity for teaching historic Baptist doctrines exciting. When most Baptist groups have watered down or simply ignored teaching doctrine, what an opportunity to shine like a bright light in a dark room! Fortunately for me and the rest of the BMA Seminary faculty, that opportunity is a mat-

ter of our purpose statement as approved by the BMA of America. The BMATS purpose statement as seen in our catalog is: "The purpose of the Seminary's divisions of undergraduate and graduate studies is to provide accredited undergraduate and graduate theological education for equipping individuals for Christ-centered service and leadership roles; to support the educational needs of the churches and agencies of the Baptist Missionary Association of America and other groups who share a like commitment to the authority of Scripture; and to serve as a resource center for critical thought and research in a context which nurtures the historical, doctrinal character of the churches of the Baptist Missionary Association of America."

At the end of the statement we see the seminary is instructed to uphold and promote the historical nature of our churches. The best way to promote our historic nature is to study and teach our doctrinal statements. The tendency of doctrinal statements for churches and associations in the past 300 years is toward minimization (fewer items are addressed and in less detail). In the last year, I visited in a Baptist church that expressed the faith for public consumption in less than 150 words. A famous Baptist theologian over a hundred years ago said of Baptist churches that "a little creed" (doctrinal statement) indicates a "little faith." Our faculty heartily subscribes to the BMA doctrinal statement with its appendices as approved by the national association. This semester doctrine is being stressed even in my sermon preparation class. At the end of each class we take about 20 minutes to review an item or doctrine of major importance to Baptists. The passages of Scripture cannot be fully preached without some exposure to an overall biblical theology such as the one expressed in our doctrinal statement and its sister document, the New • See SEMINARY Page 8 •

Hampshire Confession, as approved and published by the BMAA. Pray for the administrators and teachers that we can be as wise and kind as we are doctrinally sound. As you saw in the opening quotations, we deal with many Baptists who have been influenced by Wesleyan theology, Finneyism, and Pentecostalism. Even when doctrinal tensions arise, we must "earnestly contend."

The seminary's doctrinal basis compels us to continue pursuing what Baptists have described as the regulative principle. Simply stated, the Scriptures regulate everything we do. We only teach or do that for which we have a clear example or directive. From a pastoral standpoint, it means following Jesus' example of ministry. Jesus preached to the multitudes, taught smaller groups, and mentored individuals. We teach that present day ministers should follow this example.

We should present the Word as Jesus did. He read it aloud; He explained it; He applied it. His model was a continuation of the practice of the Old Testament prophet Ezra. This also becomes the apostolic model as seen in Paul's ministry with Timothy. Read it to the multitudes, explain it the multitudes, apply it to the multitudes—true exposition of the infallible, inerrant Word.

To smaller groups or classes, we teach men not to ignore the teaching of the deeper things of God and distinct Baptist doctrines.

We also teach and model for the younger men discipleshipthe practice of mentoring individuals in developing the skills of Bible study, prayer, worship, stewardship, witnessing, serving, and leading. This is perhaps the most neglected ministerial skill. However, it is highlighted at the BMA Seminary.

This current semester we continue the pursuit of being regulated by the Scripture with students from 11 states and 7 foreign countries. In the last twelve months we have interacted with a total of 164 students. The current semester we are encouraged with a new crop of 36 first-time students. Our off-campus programs continue to expand with the refurbishing of the Conway extension at CBC in Conway, Arkansas. Brian Rickett is the new director and is complemented with a new professor, Dr. Andy Snider. Bro. Rickett's wife, Janet, is establishing a program for seminary student wives. Brother Ricket

We spend two weeks at a church, accomplishing what we can to help with building projects. The church supplies one meal a day and we always enjoy fellowshipping with the members and it is very hard to say goodbye when it comes time to leave!

Earnestly contending for the faith costs a great deal and expenses constantly rise, just as they do for individual churches. The audit for the latest fiscal year has just arrived and it shows that we finished the year with a 3 percent operating surplus. While we are thankful for the modest surplus, 3 percent is a thin margin. Additionally, the summer months after the closing of the fiscal year on May 31 have been even thinner.

Our trustees request that clerks read this letter to associations that we cannot visit personally. They ask that you consider making an offering from the association's surplus, if you have an increase this year.

Finally, have special prayer for our students, our graduates serving in churches and on the mission field, our teachers, and our staff. Pray that we will continue to earnestly contend for the faith and to train young men to follow Jesus' pattern for ministry: <u>Preaching to many</u>, teaching a few, and mentoring one on one.
