## Some Observations from the Camp Check-In Station

From the time we moved to Missouri in 2004, I have heard lots of praises and great memories shared from Camp Garwood – from both the young and the young at heart. 
did. But the main things I learned about the Garwood family were that it's a real thing . . . and that newcomers are welcome to join.



## The Yoke Judy Wallace

The young ox had watched the process for a long time. He was fascinated that the older oxen came directly to the Master as soon as they were summoned. They knew exactly what to do; it was as if they were directly connected to Him. He would come forward slowly, speaking gently to them as He approached. They responded accordingly.

The Master brought a yoke with Him. It was plain. Rough. Massive. Most viewed it as a symbol of slavery, subjection, and servitude as with it came images of heavy burdens and long, hard hours of labor. The juvenile calf also thought it to be a thing of dread and despair. But the older animals showed no sign of fear, nor did they cower as He lowered the yoke: first fitting it over the shoulders, then around the neck.

What came next was hard to fathom. Instead of choosing a second animal to harness to the first, the Master Himself went under the weight: the lowly ox on one side, the knowing Master on the other. The beast shifted its body to adjust to the fact that the load seemed suddenly lighter, more manageable than before. The command was given to move forward and instead of a clumsy lurch that would have been expected, a slower, more purposeful gait was taken.

The calf found itself watching only the Master instead of the ox that was with Him. With each step forward, He was constantly interacting with the animal. With each step forward, He was giving instructions, pointing out pitfalls. With each step forward, He was explaining the goal and constantly calling the animal to follow His lead and learn from Him. The ox still had the same load, the same burden; but it seemed not to notice since it was now a shared load. The fact that it was watching closely, listening carefully, and engrossing itself deeply in the wise words it was being given, thoughts of self and the burdens it carried were no longer dominant. The emphasis now was on learning about the Master and from the Master. With the concentration on His instructions, attributes, and characteristics it dawned on the calf... that was the true yoke! It wasn't an instrument to be feared after all, but one that kept the eyes and the heart where they should have been all along...only on the Master. Now the ox became humble, teachable, at peace.

The calf continued to observe, thinking that the sooner he matured, the sooner his time would come to take up His yoke. But then the truth became very clear; the sooner he humbled himself to take up His yoke, the sooner he would mature.

## Reflections from Romania

Hello, my name is Caitie and I am here to tell you about my mission trip to Romania!



This summer had the opportunity serve in different parts Romania with the Risner family and Candra Barnett. Upon arrival, I met some pretty amazing people who work side by side with these families

Change Maker missionaries who live in Romania. My team of 9 worked very well with each other and, we quickly discovered our strengths and weaknesses through leading an English camp at the Agape Church plant in Oradea, Romania. Bryson Haden, from Arkansas, who was a part of our group, gave a message in English that was translated to Romanian. This was followed by some words from Bro. Bryan Risner and Bro. Dani Bagosi. That night alone we know of at least 3 salvations within the teens!

## **Chaplain Ryan Burchett and Operation Border Health Preparedness**

Operation Border Health Preparedness (OBHP) took place from July 23-29 along our southern border. OBHP is an annual humanitarian mission offering a variety of medical services to the public in six different border towns. The



goal is to prepare citizens for hurricane season. As the season ramps up, the risk increases for displacement which escalates the potential for disease to spread. OBHP functions to prevent that spread.

Chaplain (1LT-TXSG) Burchett recently served the OBHP mission at Rio Grande City and Hidalgo, both in Texas. Tasks

included patrolling the extremely long lines of people waiting for services, providing spiritual and mental/emotional counsel as needed, and offering a presence in uniform to deter any criminal activity. Being a joint operation, Chaplain Burchett, serving the Texas State Guard, worked alongside the Texas Army National Guard, Border Patrol, local law enforcement, FEMA, and some from the Chilean Army.

In a five-day span, all six checkpoints combined saw over 5,000 people; some were citizens, but many were not. Of those 5,000+, checkpoint Hidalgo, Chaplain Burchett's primary station, saw around 3,500. Needless to say, the border and those border towns are busy places.

With everything going on at OBHP, God allowed Chaplain Burchett a very unique opportunity to turn the operation into a mission trip, of sorts. During the course of OBHP, he was able to hand out 300 Gideon Bibles to those willing to take one. The Gideon New Testaments were offered in both English and Spanish. One praise to be noted was a Mexican vendor who passed through and noticed the Bibles. She asked Chaplain Burchett if he had any spare Spanish Bibles to donate to a church in Mexico that desperately needed them. He was

able to give her a box of 100 Spanish New Testaments to be taken across the border. God is good!

Along with handing out Bibles, God allowed Chaplain Burchett multiple opportunities for spiritual conversations with fellow troops and local law enforcement. He provided spiritual/biblical guidance, as well as marital counsel and sharing the Gospel during those conversations.

All service members, including Chaplain Burchett, received commendations for their efforts on OBHP '23, including the State Guard Association of the United States Meritorious Unit Citation and the Humanitarian Service Medal.
