

learn how to reach out to our Hispanic friends. The meeting time has not yet been determined. Friday evening, we hope to re-connect with our families in St. Charles, MO. We are temporarily using a space for my personal office, thanks to the hospitality of Pastor Tom and church families. This arrangement is for a couple months until we can get our own multi-purpose place for office space, worship, teaching for different ages, conference room, playground, etc. We pray hopefully by the beginning of next year we can update with more details on this muchneeded place. We have three to four families who can be blessed with our outreach in this area. We are seeking to focus on offering a Bible study on Friday evenings in St. Charles – place to be determined soon, hopefully.

Prayer Items:

- We continue to ask for you to pray with us every day at 12:00 noon for growth in this Hispanic missionary work in the areas we are led.
- We are also asking the Lord to bless us with 5 home Bible studies by the end of the year. We have two home Bible studies now after experiencing three which have been terminated due to families moving out of town during this past month. Another family asked us to stop coming to visit them as they needed time to process their decisions and direction for their family. Pray for this last family as they are struggling so much to follow Jesus.
- A core team to minister to the needs in our community. These volunteers will help with children's program while we do ESL outreach. Pray for us and with us, as the Lord leads.
- A worship team that will get together twice a week for prayer and to practice songs for Sunday evening worship service.

VSM: Not Just For Sun and Selfies

In our BMA Global family, ministry happens everywhere and all around the globe. And we're not just talking at churches, worship services, and discipleship groups. Sometimes ministry happens during basketball in the park, a hula hoop game, or face painting. More organically but intentionally and relationally, just like Jesus modeled. One example of that kind of ministry is VSM (Volunteer Student Missions), and on a recent trip thirteen students and four adults used those exact activities and others to minister in Costa Rica.



Jairo Bonilla coordinates the work there with the help of Luis Ortega (not to be confused with Lifeword Director of Operations Luis Ortega here in the States). One of the many ways Luis serves is by managing VSM teams that host Bible schools for children. The VSM Costa Rica team was blessed to have him as a local contact, interpreter, "transportation director," and so much more. One thing is for certain: He is a great example of godly leadership.

Well before the team left from the States, they met at VSM weekend in the spring for teambuilding, security training, dos and don'ts on the mission field, and cultural education. Team Costa Rica decided to use David and Goliath and Daniel in the Lions' Den for their skits, then leaders purchased supplies for the props and decorations. In one week, they held four Bible schools at two churches and a community center.

The team spoke very little, if any, Spanish, but there didn't seem to be a language barrier as I watched these young high school and college students find the shyest, the smallest, or the scaredest children and made them feel special. There were fist bumps, hugs, high-fives, and water balloon fights that left children breathless and laughing. And I watched the children as they listened to the story about a giant who was defeated and a lion whose mouth was shut, both because of a loving "Dios."

Despite the language barrier between us and the children, it was clear that the story captured their attention. Seeds were planted that day, and the gospel was shared, but only God knows what will take root.

VSM is not a vacation. It's the life-changing fulfillment of a calling to serve. And every student on the team understood that it was not about selfies, which there were plenty of when the children noticed our cell phones and wanted to see themselves in a photo.

As summer winds down and VSM trips conclude, BMA Global personnel like Angela Rice and Margaret Anderson are already planning 2024 trips. If you're considering joining one, don't hesitate to let us know so you can experience the amazing things God can do with construction paper, a sword made out of balloons, and a plastic slingshot.

As of August 6th, Sharon and I have been living and serving in Southern Zambia for 1 year! In many ways it feels like we have been here much longer because of the things that God has done this past year, while at other times, it feels like we have just arrived. When we began this journey, we didn't know really what to expect. We have been serving in full-time ministry since 2000 but this was something new. In every move we have ever made, my entire family went with us. This was the first time we would be leaving our children, and now our grandchildren, behind. This was, and still is, the hardest part of our ministry, but we know that God has sent us. Many days I have had to remind myself of Mark 10:29-31 and Matthew 19:29 as a comfort. We are both thankful for the technology that allows us to see and speak with our children and grandchildren, but we still miss holding those grandbabies as they are growing up so fast. Even with these struggles, Sharon and I both have an unexplainable peace knowing we are doing what God has called us to and have seen His hand at work. So let me move on to what God has done in this last year.

In September of 2022 Sharon and I needed to begin our language acquisition classes. The struggle was knowing which language to learn first. Zambia has 72 different dialects and there are 5 of those languages spoken here in the southern province: ChiNyanja, ChiTonga, ChiLozi, ChiBemba, ChiTokaleya. We settled on ChiNyanja, since most people here can at least understand it, if they are not fluent in it. Not knowing exactly where to begin, we posted an ad on Facebook messenger looking for a schoolteacher willing to work with us. We received many responses, but God put us in contact with a young lady who had just graduated from college as an elementary teacher who was not employed at a school yet. As we began our classes with her, we also got to know more about her and her family. I have been accused of "talking to everyone," and if you knew my dad, then you know where I got it from. Our teacher invited us to go and meet her uncle who was the headman of a small village about 2 hours from our home. As we met with her uncle and his family, we walked around his village getting to meet many of those living in the area. We realized there was no church, Bible study, or understanding of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. I asked the headman if he would mind if we came out on Thursdays to lead a Bible study with the people in his village, and he said that he had no problem with it. The next week we began a Bible study under a tree beside his hut with about 7 people, including the headman, and I shared the Gospel. This was the first time he had heard about sin, his separation from the One True God, and the penalty for this sin. The headman, Raymond, gave

The next week at Bible study we had about 30 people from Raymond's village, Chibinga, as well as 2 other neighboring villages, Kawewa and Mulungula. Raymond had gone around that whole week inviting people to "come and see" what God had done for him. One thing to mention about Raymond, he had struggled with alcoholism for

his life to Christ.

many years and many people had lost respect for him as a headman. But this week, he was sober, and there was something different about him. This made many people curious to see what had changed his life so drastically. His wife came that week and accepted Christ as well, along with Raymond's 76-year-old father. Raymond's wife, Mainza, confided in Sharon that she couldn't believe what God had done. He was a completely different man than she had known for many years; he was even reading the Bible I had given him almost non-stop. During the next week, Raymond called me and asked if I could bring a tarp to make a covering for a building if he constructed the poles. When I arrived, he had built a structure and set up logs for seats. We stretched the tarp over the top to block the heat from the sun and continued with our Bible studies. During one study as we were taking prayer requests, it was mentioned that a borehole (water well) was needed in the community as they were walking over an hour one way to get water. I told them that we would begin praying and see how God worked. One week later, as Sharon and I were driving into the village, we were met by an out-of-breath Raymond trying his best to let us know something. I couldn't make out what he was saying due to his excitement and was afraid something had happened to his son Andreas who suffers from epilepsy. As we drove into the village, I saw what his excitement was about. There was a boring machine putting in a well! The government had come with no notice and was drilling, at no cost to anyone in the village. We had a praise service that day thanking God for what he had done.

In December of 2022, we decided to have an outreach service for Christmas and expected to have about 150-200 people come. We planned a meal and prepared gifts (water bottles, crayons, and coloring sheets) for the children. We arrived early



to begin preparing for the day and were amazed to see that there was already about 200 people there, and many more walking along the road. By the time the service began we had just over 600 people! Within my mind I was overwhelmed but did my best not to show it outwardly. I could only imagine how the disciples felt when Jesus said in Matthew 14:16, you feed them. Sharon and I, along with the headman and a few of our faithful just began to pray and then proceeded with the service. That day our message began in Genesis with the perfection

of God's creation, the fall of man, the penalty for disobedience and then moved into God's plan to save us from this punishment, the real reason we celebrate Christmas, and then Jesus' death, burial, and resurrection. At the end of the service, I spoke and prayed with people wanting to receive salvation for almost 3 hours. God was once again doing something miraculous! While I was praying with people for salvation, Sharon and the ladies were cooking and beginning to serve food to feed all who had come. We began cooking that morning around 10:00 am and finished cooking at 8:00 pm, and everyone received something to eat; but the best was all of those who received the spiritual food Jesus speaks about to the woman at the well in John 4:32

God is still working in ways that I cannot explain. In fact, Sharon and I often talk about how we can't believe God is allowing us to be part of His work here. In January we began meeting on Sunday mornings for church services and on Thursday for Bible studies. We have baptized many people in a small cattle pond. It was a first for me to run the cattle and pigs out of the water, check for snakes, consider if crocodiles might have made their way from the river, and then step into the water to baptize. In June of this year, a team led by Bro. Andy Neal of Temple Baptist Church in Jonesboro, Arkansas, and Bro. Clinton Morris, an Arkansas church planter, began to build a more permanent structure for our church, Chabantu Missionary Baptist Church.

We are now making cement blocks, another first for me, so that we can construct water troughs to use for baptism closer to the church. The cattle pond I mentioned before is about a 90-minute walk from our building. We will also use these troughs to water the animals when they are not being used for baptisms. Once the troughs are constructed, we

will continue to make cement blocks to build walls for the church building as God provides the funds. We are also praying for God to help us make benches to sit on instead of just logs, but God is still saving people sitting on logs, the sand, and even leaning on nearby trees.

We have had the headmen from 4 other villages receive Christ and begin attending services and Bible studies. We also have people from 7 of those 11 villages who are attending as well. Even the senior headman, who oversees 25 villages, has started attending and has shown interest in having Bible studies in all 25 of the villages he serves. We are praying for God to raise up more leaders from within the local villages that can help teach. We currently have 4 men we e training to do just that and hopefully become

are training to do just that and hopefully become church planters one day (2 Timothy 2:2).

There are so many more stories I could share

There are so many more stories I could share about what God is doing here, and we are excited to see what God will do in this next year.



The Woods are also working with others to enhance PFPO (Pre-Field Preparation and



Seed Flinger

I saved as many seeds as I could.

One set had come from the sweetest, juiciest watermelon we had tasted all summer. It was a verified Cave City, Arkansas, melon and had the stickers to prove it!

Next were the seeds I saved from a Candy Kissed cantaloupe. My oh my! There couldn't possibly be a sweeter, more delicious variety than these and they were found at my closest Sam's club.

And then there were the peaches. Bought almost weekly at our local fruit stand, these are my favorite fruit. Even though the seeding and growing process for them is more difficult and won't produce fruit for many years, I still saved the pits determined to give planting a try.

Three different kinds of seeds now sit in the windowsill of my utility room. All three have differing requirements on how and when to plant and care for the seedlings. But plant them I must if I want them to bear fruit at some point in time. And realize I must that even with my best efforts, the actual production of the fruit is totally up to our Creator God. Fruit is the goal!

Evangelism is very similar. Cited as one of the most difficult of the spiritual disciplines to develop (the other two being prayer and memorization of scripture), sharing the gospel of Jesus Christ seems to bring anxiety, fear, and guilt for not obeying His direct command to be a witness for Him wherever we go.

The analogy only goes so far but differs in the fact that the spiritual seed doesn't change. It is the gospel of Jesus Christ given to us in His Word. But the soils are different. The time of germination is different. The result may be different but the end goal in each and every situation is fruit.

Why do we make this so difficult? What are our excuses?

"I don't know what to say."

"What if I say the wrong thing?"

"What if they ask me a question that I don't know how to answer?"

"I don't really have any opportunities to witness."

I think we wrongly feel like if we don't 'seal the deal' and make it all the way through to a prayer of repentance then we have failed. That is just not so. Instead we must realize that our lives and words are to be those of a 'seed

flinger': one who interjects God into our conversations as much as possible and always shows Him in our lives.

Does the interaction with a stranger bring up the topic of weather? Then state, "I'm so glad I'm not in charge of the weather. The Lord knows what He is doing." I've had responses all the way from "Yes, He does" to "I'm not so

sure"! But seed was flung!

When you sit down for a meal at a restaurant, before you ask God's blessing on the food, tell your waitstaff what you are about to do and ask if there is anything that you can pray about for them. Those answers? "No, I'm good." "My dad had a stroke." "My sister is in a bad place." "My little girl is starting kindergarten and I'm anxious about that." One girl just fell into my arms and 'big cried' because a patron had just chewed her out. Seed was flung.

Maybe there is a person in a wheelchair at the store that is trying to reach an item and you get it for them. They will almost always say thank you and then you can simply say, "That was from Jesus!" You may get some odd stares but seeds were flung!

Listen to the song, Fifteen.

What if this is the case? What if it does take fifteen times of seeds being planted in a person before they have hearts soft enough to really hear the gospel? I know that is an arbitrary number. Some accept Christ the very first time they hear about Him and what He has done for them. Some have been raised in church and heard the gospel three times a week for their lifetime until one day they realize that message is for them! Christ died for them! What if you have the privilege to be just one of those seed flingers in a person's life that helps prepare good soil for the planting of God's Word? What a blessing.

What if you are number fifteen?!?! What if you do have the privilege of taking someone through the plan of salvation? Does that stir fear in your heart? We will cover that in my next blog. Until then, meditate on these scriptures and respond to them.
