State BMA Meets at Sikeston

The Baptist Missionary Association of Missouri met October 14th at Bethel Baptist Church of Sikeston. Although the solar eclipse that morning was itself eclipsed with overcast skies, for the churches represented nothing eclipsed the fellowship of the meeting.

Pastor Billy Davis extended a welcome to everyone; then we joined together in congregational singing led by Matt Bolen, accompanied on the piano by his daughter Mattie. Following this Bro. Joe McElroy shared some devotional thoughts for the morning.

Moderator Brad Banderman called the business meeting to order. Final Enrollment Committee figures reported 34 messengers, 9 visitors, and \$2,100 in offerings to the Minute Fund.


Highlights from the department reports included the details of the upcoming Alive Conference. (See separate announcement in this issue.) Camp hosted 207 campers this summer, with 16 professions of faith – and plans major renovations for one of the dorms in the coming year. Publication Committee report noted that no application has been received for the open position of editor for *The Missouri Missionary Baptist*, and as such, the Association voted to re-elect Don Burke as interim editor. The Loan Association reported a fund balance in

excess of \$450,000 (including just over \$10,000 in the Grant Fund).

In the Missionary Committee portion of the meeting Ben Kingston shared the Missions Director's report, and Juan Fernandez gave an update of his Hispanic work in the St. Louis area. The committee voted to retain the same officers for another year (Brian Kingston, chairman; Michael Kelly, assistant chairman; Brian Meade, clerk; Jeff Moorman, assistant clerk). The committee (and subsequently the full Association) also approved the recommendations of the Special Missions Committee, which included continued support for Bro. Fernandez and the allocation of \$1,000 from the Missions Fund for the

Missions Director to use to set up a BMAMO Missions booth at the National BMAA meeting in April 2024.

After a wonderful lunch provided by the host church, Pastor Davis shared the annual sermon, taken from Philippians 4. Ben Kingston voiced the Association's appreciation to Bro. Davis for the message.

Bro. John Beardsley presented to the Association his desire to compile a history of the BMA of Missouri, asking churches to contribute their individual histories to that work.

The 2024 Missions Symposium and Mid-Year Meeting will meet on May 17th and 18th at Bethel, Lonedell. The Annual Meeting will be October 12th at Kewanee, New Madrid.

The Night Before Gun Season (Hunter's Christmas)

I know that this is an article about missions from your missions director, but since this Saturday is November 11 - the opening day of 2023 gun season - I wanted to share with you this writing that I did last gun season in 2022 to illustrate a point of the Great Commission. We are not to be "of" this world but "in" this world, letting our light shine no matter what we do. The apostle Paul said do all to the glory of God. So, as you go this month don't forget that you are on mission with God winning a lost world to Himself.

"Now then we are ambassadors for Christ, as though God did beseech you by us: we pray you in Christ's stead, be ye reconciled to God. For he hath made him to be sin for us, who knew no sin; that we might be made the righteousness of God in him." (2 Corinthians 5:20-21).

Let me begin by explaining that this is not a poem, but a writing of the importance of the night before gun season to a sincere Christian hunter. There is nothing on this planet or in this universe to compare to the incarnate Christ lying in a manger preparing to carry the weight of the world on His shoulders to the cross to pay for the sins of all mankind. This is in no way a writing to compare this silly event of gun season to Christ or what He did for us as much as to share from a hunter's heart the joy of this evening. In a very small way, it is reminiscent of the joy that we get before opening presents each Christmas. It's a joy that truly only the avid deer hunter or any species hunter on the night before the opening day of their particular season can relate to.

For me, it is a restless night. I'm thinking of my stand placement. I'm trying to remember everything! I'm usually forgetting a few things while I'm remembering other things and thinking about where to place other hunters that I may be responsible for. I'm thinking about the hopes and dreams of some other hunters who have told me of their possibilities. I'm trying to remember to buy my tags. I'm wondering if my truck is ready for the trip, if I'll be able to actually find my stand that I placed the day before in the dark. Where's my flashlight? Oh yeah, that's right! It's in my hunting pack. Where did I put my hunting pack? That's right, it's in the truck. Where are my keys? You get the point!

It's a night of hoping that my family understands how much I appreciate the fact that they allow me to have this opportunity, which on some level may seem like a neglectful time to them. But in reality, it's just them letting me do something that I enjoy while I try to be faithful to do the same for them. It's also an opportunity for me to give my wife a gift. We call it the "deer season gift."

When you finally get on that deer stand as the sun is coming up, the Holy Spirit is always faithful to encourage my time with Him! I've probably cried as much on a deer stand as I have, not because of those sweet times with the Creator of the very thing that I enjoy doing, and even though harvesting/killing a deer has become more frequent in my older age than it was in my


Snapshots from Fall Retreat

Prayer Network

We continue praying 5,5,5: Praying for 5 people for 5 minutes for 5 days every day at 12:00. We have been praying that each one among our Hispanic friends experiences the spiritual birth, discovering God's purpose for their life. It has been almost three years since our journey began with the BMA. We have been through a lot of opportunities to meet new friends while we practice prayer walks, handing out Bibles, and through our Facebook Live broadcast. A personal goal before heading back home to my wife and children is to have been able to reach at least ten men on a daily basis. We are reaching to men who are not members of any church, to unchurched friends, and to those who profess some religion but are not practicing. The American dream has many of these men captive to a tight schedule in which they have a hard time setting up time to at least start getting together for Bible study. The lack of understanding of the Gospel and how God can transform lifestyles makes it more challenging for any of these people to commit to a series of Bible studies. Send us your 5 that we can pray with you. Each one of these souls is precious in God's sight, Acts 16:31.

Our process is simple, we utilize 1, 3, and 7 number of Bible studies for each one of the contacts. The first meeting is to share the Gospel. The next three meetings are to go over faith foundational truths about the Gospel. The seven other meetings are to go over a Bible Study in Discovery. Most of the men can't commit beyond the third meeting. They express desire to have a new life in the moment when the Gospel is presented, but very few have been able to complete the process to become disciples who make disciples. Would you join us in prayer that each one of the men in our contacts receives the Gospel and grows in faith to fulfill God's purpose for his life? Thank you.

Discovery Bible Study

We are praying the Lord's provision for six DBS at homes in the 20 miles radius around our place. We are praying for open doors for the Gospel and our ministry to be taken into the level of spiritual health and reproduction in the next two years, to the glory of God.

At this moment we have two DBS happening since August 2023. We are gathering for DBS every Monday from 4:00 to 6:00 p.m. in Clarkson Valley. We are so blessed to have been visiting this young man since December of last year. Hamed is learning about the Bible being the only authority to lead every man and woman into a relationship with God through the work and person of Jesus. The lordship of Jesus has been always a point of discussion since God's grace continues showing up every time we gather in his house. There is light


that we pray continues shining in this young man's heart and soon in each one of his family members.

Sundays 6:00 p.m. we gather with Liz and Lucas to have a time of worship and Bible study. We have set apart the first Sunday of the month to bring something for dinner. We have been experiencing many challenges in the health of Lucas's mom, Liz, since she is on a waiting list for a surgery sometime this coming month of December – the sooner the better. Would you lift this family in your prayer? And would you also pray for Daniel and Rebekah? They have three young adult children that have been looking to join in different churches around the area. Building Blocks in Zambia

The fall months in the United States begin the hot season for us here in the southern province of Zambia. Many things start to take place – farmers begin planting, the elephants are making their way back for water and food, and the rain is soon upon us.

For the past two months we have been making blocks for the church building. This has been a new experience for me and Sharon. Driving to collect sand from the roads and digging up rocks a few kilometers from the church instead of just going to purchase blocks from a hardware store. With the help of the men from the local villages, we are able to make about 300 blocks per day. Once the blocks come out of the form we had crafted, they must sit and cure for 14 days. These blocks must also be watered three times per day to ensure that once they are complete they will be strong and able to stand on their own for many years.

This reminded me of why Sharon and I moved from a small town in Northeast Arkansas, to the rural areas of Zambia, Africa. Our heart is to bring the Gospel of Jesus Christ to those who were previously unreached. 2 Timothy 2:2 has been our battle cry as we reach out into these local villages: "And the things that thou hast heard of me among many witnesses, the same commit thou to faithful men, who shall be able to teach others also." God began preparing us for this ministry many years ago, allowing us to gather "sand & gravel" from the many pastors and leaders who took the time to pour into us. Now as we are preparing the "blocks," we must ensure that everyone is transformed




into the image of Christ. We meet weekly for Bible studies within the villages and offer biblical foundations for many new believers as well as those who are still seeking. I meet three days per week with men who have a calling upon their lives to be pastors, teachers, and leaders, training them to reach their own community. Sharon is beginning to meet with the ladies from the local villages to offer a more in-depth biblical teaching designed just for them.

Our prayer is for the local community to have pastors and leaders who can go and plant churches, raising up leaders, and to begin to multiply the work of the Lord. There are a lot of tools and curriculum that is available – and we utilize those as that, a tool; but the foundation of our teaching comes from the Word of God. Everything we do here is centered on the Bible.

I remind the church, pastors, and leaders every time we meet that the Word of God is our anchor to truth. When we teach and preach, everything should come from His word and not just an opinion. Already we have given out over 400 Bibles in local languages to the community. Sharon and I want the people to know that what is being taught is not from us, but

from God. This is the "watering" of the blocks, the daily encouragement to read for themselves what God is saying. We even have a woman within our church who is working to teach those who cannot read in any language to be able to read the Word of God. We have others who get their children to read the Bible to their families. We have also placed three proclaimers from *Faith Comes by Hearing* who read the Bible in the local languages. These proclaimers are placed at a headman's home in three different villages and reads the

Word of God all day long. Anyone who comes by is able to stop and hear the message from the Bible.

So, thank you. Thank each and every one of you who have prayed for us, sent money for us to purchase these Bibles, sent the funding to help build the church, and to those who have poured into us for so many years. Without you, we couldn't do what we are doing here. We all have an influence where we are planted. Whose blocks are you going to water today?

restrooms. The main area of the building is large enough for sports activities and larger gatherings of all kinds. I retired. I expected to have time for parties and fun events; and I do. But it seems I now attend more funerals than birthday parties and anniversaries combined. After I did the math, I realized I was closer to old age than I am closer to middle age. I suppose that has been true for a long time, but I have avoided the math. Now I have time to think about it. I've always known I was going to die, but now I am convinced of it.

I have resisted joining a golden-agers group at my church for several years, but now I'm in. It's more fun than attending funerals. It is actually a great experience., For instance, we recently went to Petit Jean Mountain to look at the leaves. We have leaves at home, but it is more fun looking at someone else's. Plus, they are supposed to turn colors earlier than ours.

I don't have many leaves in my own yard. We only just planted a tree a year ago. It doesn't have many leaves. I may not even have to rake them if God answers my prayer for all 12 of them to blow into my neighbor's yard.

When they turn color, I will worry that the tree has died, but probably only the leaves will die. The tree should survive to grow a new set in the spring. Leaves are beautiful as they die. Still, when they fall, they are dead.

It is strange that, though we must rake fallen leaves, God created beauty in death.

Though our grief often blurs it, there is also beauty in a Christian's death.

Death is the end of suffering. It is the end of old age. Death is the doorway to a more fulfilling life. No more sickness. No more sorrow.

From God's perspective death is a blessing. "Precious in the sight of the Lord is the death of his saints" (Psalm 116:15). A blessing for Him and a blessing for us, for we will forever be in His presence.

As the tree remains, though it loses its leaves, our core being remains after death. Ultimately, God will decorate our soul with a new body.
