


Praises!



Recommendations from the SSG Committee

Following the May mid-year Association meeting, we made efforts to arrange an organizational meeting of the Seminary Student Grant (SSG) Committee, which oversees the Kenneth E. Gibson Seminary Student Grant Fund. However, in doing so we encountered an unexpected snag. The Association Bylaws specify that this Committee is composed of the Missions Director, the Editor of the state paper and the various chairmen of the Association's standing committees. The problem is, "standing committee" is a designation that the Association discontinued using around 2011. And since there are no longer any designated standing committees, there are no longer any chairmen of such committees to compose the SSG Committee.

After realizing this dilemma caused by the failure to keep our Bylaws current, the two remaining SSG committeemen (Ben Kingston as Missions Director, and Don Burke as Editor) have considered themselves a committee of two, serving in somewhat of an emergency capacity, taking care of pressing business with an eye towards recommending Bylaw updates to be considered at the October meeting.

In addition to the above, the SSG Committee has considered the recent workload on the Committee, plus requested feedback from the Seminary on specific details of the current guidelines. Based upon all of this the Committee recommends the following changes to the BMA of Missouri Bylaws, Article VII, Section 4 (changes designated by underscoring):

- Item B: The SSG Committee shall be composed of three members: The Director of Missions, the Editor of the Missouri Missionary Baptist paper and the current Moderator of the Association. (In the event that the Director or Editor is also serving as Moderator, the Assistant Moderator will serve as the third member of this Committee.) The expenses of each committeeman shall be paid out of the general fund of the department he represents.
- Item F: ... (b) complete at least nine hours of credit each semester for undergraduate work, or six hours for graduate work (not applicable to those in the "Masters in Motion" program)....
- Item G.i: Traditional On-Campus and Online Grant: (a) the student's tuition each semester (b) up to \$300.00 per semester for books and (c) for on-campus students, up to \$1,000.00 of actual moving expenses for the initial move to Jacksonville, TX.

Control Freaks

I will just go ahead and say it out loud — I like being in control! There, it is out in the open, and now we can address it transparently and biblically. If you know me, I am sure you were not shocked or surprised by my open confession. The interesting element in this declaration is that some will see people like me as the problem. Others think we need more people like us. Leadership is given as a spiritual gift according to Rom. 12:8 — "he that ruleth, with diligence." Paul clearly stated that if God has given you the ability to lead, you should take that responsibility seriously.

James 3 reminds us that those who step into a leadership role as teachers will be held to a higher standard and receive a stricter judgment. Leadership is not to be taken lightly nor accepted casually. The challenge of pastoring is that there is an unrealistic expectation that he will be gifted and equipped in all five roles (not positions) mentioned in Eph. 4:11 — apostle, prophet, evangelist, pastor and teacher. The church needs a pastor (a caring shepherd) with a heart for the flock and a preacher (a capable teacher) who rightly divides and delivers the Word of God.

You must know yourself to lead yourself, and that requires knowing your gifts along with your strengths and weaknesses, knowing who you are in Christ and then being committed to who you are in Him. You cannot be someone else. If you are not being who Christ created you to be, who are you? The answer is most likely "confused." Someone said, "A mist in the pulpit creates a fog in the pew." A healthy leader knows Christ intimately, knows himself and his inclinations (personality and giftings), then seeks out the instruction needed to lead well. Find someone who can pour into your life (Col. 1:7).

Every church needs strong leadership to direct the congregation to be true to its mission, vision and values. The leadership style will look different, but the need for devoted biblical leadership cannot be overlooked or overstated. As clarified in I Tim. 3:1-13 and Titus 1:5-9, the foundation must be built upon character. The temptation is to look first for charisma and competency, but that is a dangerous

approach. Leaders must be observed, watched and proven faithful. When speaking of elders, Paul reminded us in I Tim. 5:22, "lay hands suddenly on no man."

Leaders are desperately needed. While raising up leaders should not be rushed, it must be intentional with an eye always focused on developing and equipping more leaders. Tony Morgan stated, "People inside the church can get very loud. Those voices are much louder than the people outside the church." Leaders continually challenge the congregation not to become inwardly focused. As soon as you prioritize the inside voices, you diminish God's voice in stating, "Go... and make disciples of all nations..." The mission statement at your church must remain the loudest voice in driving you toward the Great Commission.

Leaders know their mission as directed by Scripture, then remain true to the vision of carrying out that mission. Decide if you are truly committed to the mission God has called your church to and in carrying it out. Leaders stick to that vision, even if that means someone is not willing to stick with the church. There will be many difficult decisions, not because you do not know what you should do, but because of the pressure to do something else. Leaders must be willing to make the hard decisions and refuse to compromise or take the easy path.

Most leaders are driven, passionate and determined. While that is usually a strength, it can also become a weakness if you fall into the "I can do it better" trap of perfectionism. Whatever we do, we should strive to do it well - not doing it

perfectly, but doing it as well as we can. The old saying, "If you want it done right, do it yourself," can haunt you and undermine your leadership quickly. Tony Morgan stated, "If you are a perfectionist, people don't like to be around you." Just because it is your idea does not guarantee it is the best or

the only way. Does any of that describe you?


Tony continued, "Needing to be in control will kill you. It leads to anxiety and fear. It's an indication that God is not in control. It will paralyze you. If you always do it, no one else will learn, and you will always be stuck thinking you must do it. It's a vicious cycle." Now that one hurt. Godly leaders are resolved to fulfill God's agenda for their church and ministry, but they are also committed to recruiting and training others to help in that mission. A control freak seeks to always do it themselves, and that robs others of the opportunity to see God at work in and through their lives.

When you choose to do everything yourself, you are taking the path of least resistance because it is much easier than training someone else how to do it. Building a team requires finding them, training them, coaching them, resourcing them, checking in on them and giving them the authority to fulfill what you have equipped them to do. Are we going to settle for the easier path, even though the harder path ultimately leads to greater accomplishments and fulfillment? It may be time to once again look at passages like John 20:21; Eph. 4:12-13; II Tim. 1:13, 2:2, 3:14; and many more.

Tony Morgan, in Unstuck Church, gave this soulpenetrating thought, "It's possible to do the work of God without doing the work God has called you to do." No one is designed to do all the work of the ministry. Instead, God designed His body, His church, to perform and fulfill the ministry He called her to accomplish.

Mwabuka buti from the Quillman family, serving in the Southern Province of Zambia. We hope this finds you blessed and encouraged. We are writing to you today with a mix of challenges and blessings from our mission field. Drought and Famine

Zambia is facing an unprecedented drought and famine, affecting countless communities. The land is parched, and water sources are scarce. Yet, in the midst of this dryness, we find hope in Jesus' promise: "Whoever believes in



me, as the Scripture has said, 'Out of his heart will flow rivers of living water.'" (John 7:38).

We are reminded of God's faithfulness in Isaiah 43:19, "Behold, I am doing a new thing; now it

springs forth, do you not perceive it? I will make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert." Even in the desert, God can create a river. We trust that He will bring life-giving water to our communities, both physically and spiritually.

Drought-Related Challenges

The drought has brought an unexpected challenge to our area. Elephants, searching for food, have wandered into town, causing significant damage to local gardens, fences, and buildings. Sadly, three lives were lost in August due to elephant encounters. The elephants are only returning to areas with available food sources, highlighting the severity of the drought.

Food Shortage

The situation is further exacerbated by a severe food shortage. Most of our families are receiving less than one meal per day, making it difficult to survive. We do our best to provide support, but the need is great. Even walking to church has become a hardship with the lack of daily calories for energy.

Chabantu Missionary Baptist Church

Despite these challenges, our church is thriving! This Sunday, we welcomed 16 new members to our family, and we will be baptizing five more next

Sunday. God is moving mightily in the hearts of our Zambian brothers and sisters.

Community School Update

Our community school, Chabantu Baptist Academy, is growing! We currently have



children ages 3 to grade 6, and we're providing breakfast and lunch for them along with our five dedicated teachers and two teachers assistants. The school is not only a place for education but also a hub for spiritual growth. About 50 of the children and some of their families are now attending our church on Sundays, and we're seeing the impact of God's love in their lives. *Prayer Requests*



Where to Begin

At my house we get a newspaper from the Texas Farm Bureau. A couple months ago the cover story was about a young lady who was carrying on her family's ranching legacy. Her father started a farm, carrying out a dream he and his late wife had. Now his daughter has taken over the dream and is expanding it. The title caught my attention, "A Ranching Legacy".

I bet you know what part of it spoke to me. But it made me think, what about people who are not handed a legacy worth building on?

God blessed me by planting me in a family of believers. I attended church sporadically with my great grandfather, and lots with my grandparents. My parents were very involved in church and lived out what the Bible taught them. But not everyone is so fortunate.

So, what do you do if your Christian legacy begins with YOU? I have good news for you. Paul spent much of his ministry writing to people who were in that same position. People who trusted Jesus. People who wanted to live right; but people who had no legacy to lean on. In II Corinthians 5:17-18 Paul wrote, "Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, the

new creation has come: the old has gone, the new is here! All this is from God...." God did that for the Corinthians and he can/will do it for you.

One of Satan's biggest weapons is throwing our past up in our face. Don't listen to him. God took it all away when you believed in Jesus. You are whiter than snow.

If you want to begin a godly legacy, you need to know how to build a good foundation. Read Paul's epistles and James. They lay out a great foundation for living a godly life. As you read, pray. Ask God to open your heart to His desires for you. And when you fall short, don't beat yourself up. Everybody misses the mark sometimes (or lots of times). The standards are high because our measure is Jesus Christ, but remember God doesn't expect perfection – He expects effort.

Another great help in getting started on a godly legacy is plugging into a Christian group. That may be a Sunday School class, Bible study, or other group of Christians who are living life together. If you already attend Sunday worship, I would encourage you to get into a small group also. This is where accountability takes place and to live a godly life, we need accountability.

Now let's talk about a harder thing.

There are some things that you might have to let go of; habits, people, characteristics that might not be a good foundation for the legacy you want to lay. Psalm 139:23-24 says, "Search me, God, and know my heart; test me and know my anxious thoughts. See if there is any offensive way in me, and lead me in the way everlasting."

Pray, my friend. Pray for God to reveal things that need to be done away with and pray that He will help you toss them. He will! Isaiah 43:18-19 says, "Forget the former things: do not dwell in the past. See, I am doing a new thing! Now it springs up; do you not perceive it? I am making a way in the wilderness and streams in the wasteland." God's promises in the Old Testament, to His chosen people, are still true today, to His chosen family.

One last thing I want to encourage you to do is find a mentor or accountability partner. This is good for all of us, not just those beginning their legacy. I know several of my friends who would be great in this role and I bet there are several in your world too. It may be stepping out of your comfort zone to ask for help but we all need help every once in a while. None of us has it all together, so get that out of your head.

Lamentations 3:22-23 says, "Because of the Lord's great love we are not consumed, for his compassions never fail. They are new every morning; great is your faithfulness." Good morning friend, may God's mercies fall fresh on you as you build a legacy that will be an honor to him.

Scripture: Matthew 5, 6, 7; Ephesians 4:17-32; Romans 12; James 1:19-27

Response: Take a deep breath. Just as Rome wasn't built in a day, neither is a firm foundation. Pick one pillar for your foundation and begin to build it. It may be one listed above, or something different. Just start. There is no right or wrong as long as you are building. And lean on God, he is the Master Builder.

Prayer: Dear Lord, you always give us choices. Help me to choose to be the wise man and not the foolish man. I want to lay a foundation that my family can build on for years to come. Storms will come, but help me to build a house that withstands. In Jesus' name, Amen

- Voting can be viewed as a form of stewardship (Matthew 25). "We are responsible for voting for candidates who will best honor God and moral values" (Dr. Stephen Olford). Otherwise, we waste the opportunity given to us as believers and Americans, leaving the decision to others who may not share our convictions. From the history books, Samuel Adams was the organizer of the Boston Tea Party and a signer of the Declaration of Independence. Adams said your vote is a stewardship issue, arguing that we should vote "unto God" and, to the best of our knowledge, elect people who will be moral leaders. That was a conviction strongly held during the early days of our nation that remains important today.
- Jesus calls His followers to be "salt and light," a teaching that includes our voting. How can we claim to live fully for God yet neglect to represent His values? (Tony Perkins). Shouldn't we care who leads our school board, our state and who represents us in Congress? From your county to Washington, who we help elect will determine the future laws that impact us, our children and future generations (The Judicial Watch).
- We no longer live in a culture that will easily accept biblical worldview issues. If we choose to speak out or vote for our values, we will face persecution. That response should not be shunned, but embraced. After all, our Savior warned us that in this world we would have trouble (John 16:33). Let us not shy away from voting for our values. May we, as Christians, vote on Nov. 5, 2024!



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Keeping Your Buckets Filled

Leading on Empty is a book by Wayne Cordeiro that can also be a reality in your life. How do you keep your tank full and your passion renewed? There are four buckets that Hal Seed says need to be kept full: spiritual practices, character strengths, relational skills, and ministry experience. As a leader you must not only lead yourself well but lead others well also. Your intimacy with Christ will enable you to leverage influence for Christ. You are called to live like Jesus and to lead like Jesus.

Relational skills are paramount in leadership because of the importance of team building, problem solving, time management, resolving conflict, communicating well then executing your God-initiated plan. In building your relational skill set, you must know yourself to lead yourself. You must be willing to evaluate how God hard-wired you. Are you more of an extrovert or introvert? Are you more people oriented or task oriented? What are you passionate about? Are you more bent towards working on a team or working alone? Knowing yourself means you are aware of your strengths and weaknesses.

Emotional intelligence cannot be overlooked in leadership. Effective leaders know Christ intimately, know what they need to know through instruction, and know themselves and their inclinations. If you are walking with Christ and receiving the instruction needed for the task ahead but have no self-awareness, you will be frustrated. Three markers in developing your relational skills are self-discipline (knowing Christ), self-development (knowing the right stuff), and self-discovery (knowing yourself). Everyone has blind spots, and you need to spend time with the Lord asking Him to show you yours.

How do you develop relational skills? First, love people the way Christ loves them by valuing them. Philippians 2:3 says it like this: "Let nothing be done through strife or vainglory; but in lowliness of mind let each esteem others better than themselves." Think about what number you place on someone's value in your life and ministry. Is it a six or a seven or some other number? The reality is

that they will never surpass the value number you assign them. Go ahead and give them a ten because if you find yourself always busy doing things you are not gifted to do, maybe it is because you are not equipping, empowering, and deploying others.

God has sent people to you to help you on the journey and to help your church to address its deficiencies. Relational skills are required in leading the church to where God is guiding it to go by creating a climate for change. By loving and valuing the people around you, you can then begin building a team that challenges, encourages, and esteems one another. Focus on the coalition of the willing and remember that you will always have the Sanballats and Tobiahs around (See Nehemiah). Make sure that you are not being overly swayed by the vocal minority or the squeaky wheel but also be willing to minister to them as best you can.

Your relational skills will become crucial when facing trials or leading change. Sometimes they can be the same thing. In a lot of churches, the word change is almost a cuss word. In a recent Healthy Church Solutions training Dr. John David Smith reminded us about empathy. When leading change that is God-initiated, learn to empathize with those who are struggling with that change. Every time there is change, someone will see it as a loss. Make sure you explain the reason for the change. If people believe in the "why" then they will accept the "what." Have you slowed down long enough to carefully explain the why?

Ministry experience is the fourth bucket. Here is what Hal Seed has to say on this: "We put most of our personal development attention on collecting ministry competencies like preaching and leading, but somehow, it's never enough. We still have problems and our churches don't grow. Ministry expertise is more than the competencies of being a pastor. It's the wisdom that comes with learning, experience, and reflection so that with broad knowledge you can do the right things to see your church grow."

Maybe you have no ministry experience but there is someone out there who does. Go find him and learn from him.

Leadership requires passion and discipline to accomplish our God-initiated vision for the ministry He has placed us in. Here is a great description from Dr. John David Smith of what passion and discipline need to look like: Passion sees the vision; Discipline translates it into action. Passion attracts a team; Discipline builds the team. Passion makes good decisions; Discipline implements the decisions. Passion establishes values; Discipline lives the values out. Passion envisions a healthy culture; Discipline makes it happen. Passion describes the goal; Discipline forms the strategy to reach the goal!

Passion creates priorities; Discipline executes the priorities. Passion generates ideas; Discipline turns them into reality. Passion challenges people to grow; Discipline helps them do it. Passion drives innovation; Discipline drives implementation!

Paul was passionate, but he also had a plan he followed given to him by the Lord. When thinking about these buckets that need to be filled (spiritual practices, character strengths, relational skills, and ministry experience), make sure you are not having a pep rally without a game plan. What steps do you need to take in each of these areas to become a better leader? Make a list and begin working on them today.
