

World Missions Day: 75 Years of Global Missions





The Danger of Pride

The book of James reminds us of the God we serve and how He operates with those who seek to serve Him.

God "resists the proud but gives grace (strength) to the humble." In the world today of the celebrity pastor the caution to remain humble is not determined by the size of your congregation but the size of your ego. Pride is not necessarily the outflow of success, but rather, the condition of the heart. God makes the warning clear that you should not think more highly of yourself than you ought to think. According to Philippians, Jesus (God in the flesh) did not consider His position to be something used for His own advantage.

Proverbs 29:23 states clearly, "A man's pride will bring him low, but a humble spirit will obtain honor.

In God-Initiated Leadership, Bill Elliff states, "Pride lowers, humility exalts. A desire to be known will cause a man to be known for all the wrong reasons." What are you known for? Are you known for control, being in charge, and always doing things your way? Or are you known for encouraging and equipping others by helping them to succeed? Are you ready to hear other ideas, knowing that quite often the ideas shared with you are much better than your own? God does not look favorably (in any way) upon anyone's pride.

Pride has a way of showing up in every area of our lives including our attitudes and in our actions. It is always asking, what about me? How come I am not being noticed and recognized? Henry Blackaby speaks to this by stating, "When you complete the task God gave you and no one expresses thanks for what you have done, the Father's grace surrounds you, and He reminds you that you have a heavenly reward where everything you have done in the Lord's

Dear BMAMO Churches,

Here is a quote for pondering – from the book *The Ruthless Elimination of Hurry* (by John Mark Comer) – Dallas Willard's definition of a spiritual discipline: "The disciplines are activities of mind and body, purposefully undertaken, to bring our personality and total being into effective cooperation with the divine order. They enable us more and more to live in a power that is, strictly speaking, beyond us, deriving from the spiritual realm itself."

As I ponder that quote from Dallas Willard, it sounds familiar.

First this, "The disciplines are activities of mind and body." Isn't this what we strive to do each new year? Well don't stop, because it is a discipline, an activity our minds and bodies desperately need.

Around this time of year I hear all of the excuses and wise musings why New Year's resolutions, or 'disciplines,' do not work. Well, in my opinion that is not the fault of the discipline or the practice of said discipline – it is the fault of the disciple.

So remember, the most important thing in discipline is that you start at least one more time than you stop.

Secondly, "purposefully undertaken." Hopefully enough said, but in case it's not, suffice to say you have to be intentional in your discipline or you will never become a disciplined person.

Thirdly, "to bring our personality and total being into effective cooperation with the divine order." Now, isn't that what we as Christians hope for, long for, and so desperately need? To be conformed to the image of Christ! Discipline of our personality and body is the only way there.

Fourth, "they enable us more and more to live in a power that is, strictly speaking, beyond us." We are not capable of this level of spirituality but Christ is, and through the discipline of dying to self and allowing Christ to live through us we will achieve that heavenly image.

To quote an amazing missionary from Zambia (Mickeal Quillman), "When you are on a cross you are all in!"

Fifth, "deriving from the spiritual realm itself." "I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me."

So go ahead, don't listen to the naysayers and make those New Year's resolutions. Make a list of the shortcomings and problems you have and match them with the discipline that will overcome them and get to work through the power of Christ.





Send Me!

Dr. John David Smith

For seventy-five years, BMA Global Missions has been a testament to God's faithfulness, weaving a story of sacrifice, transformation, and hope across generations. Reflecting on its rich history, one cannot help but feel a deep sense of nostalgia – images of missionaries embracing foreign cultures, building bridges of trust, and planting seeds of faith come to mind. This legacy is not merely a recollection of past triumphs but a vivid reminder of the incarnational call to missions: to live among, serve, and love people as Christ did. BMA's past blessings are more than milestones; they are guiding lights for future ministry, inspiring us to step into communities with humility and intentionality, carrying forward the gospel in both word and deed.

The incarnational approach to global missions is a vital model from Christ to us. THE INCARNATION is that divine event when the second person of the Trinity, Jesus Christ, became flesh and dwelt among us. The incarnational model of missions is when we follow the model of Christ to empty ourselves of home, family, and ambitions to live among people to whom God has called us, serve with no inhibitions, and love in an unlimited fashion. Incarnational missions is the expression of the declaration, "Send Me!"

John G. Paton was a Scottish missionary to the New Hebrides Islands (modern-day Vanuatu) in the

South Pacific during the 19th century.

Paton and his wife Mary arrived on the island of Tanna in 1858, fully aware of the dangers they faced. The island's indigenous people were largely unreached with the gospel and practiced cannibalism. Shortly after their arrival, Mary

gave birth to a son, but tragedy soon struck. Both Mary and their infant son succumbed to fever, leaving Paton alone in a hostile environment.

Despite his profound grief and the constant threat of attack from the islanders, Paton remained resolute in his mission. He lived in a tree for weeks to escape hostile villagers and endured intense loneliness and danger. Eventually, his efforts bore fruit as he was able to gain the trust of some locals, sharing with them the transformative message of the gospel.

Years later, Paton returned to the islands after remarrying, this time serving on the island of Aniwa. Through his unyielding commitment and love, the entire population of Aniwa converted to Christianity. They even built a church, symbolizing their transformation and new faith.

John G. Paton's story is a testament to the incredible cost of missionary service and the


power of God's work through those willing to risk everything for the sake of the gospel. His life continues to inspire generations of believers to take up the call to missions with unwavering passion and dedication.

Whether your congregation was recently

established in a remote village in Papua New Guinea, began in a European city decades ago, or was planted in a small sawmill town in the southern United States in the 1800s, one truth remains: God used a simple sinner, saved by grace, as His incarnational instrument to share the gospel, disciple believers, and bring them together to form that congregation. Churches do not simply appear from nothing. There has to be a heart transformed by the gospel, a heart filled with the Spirit of God, a heart dominated by the Word of God, and a heart totally

given to the call of God's mission in a specific place. It is that missionary passion and dedication that God has used over and over in just about every corner of the globe to make His name known and fulfill His mission. There will never be a better, more innovative, less sacrificial, or more effective approach to missions than the complete surrender and service embodied in a pure-hearted "Send Me!"

She looked up into her grandfather's eyes and said, "Papa, that's cool!" and off she went. From that point on she became "Princess Madison."

End of story? Not just yet.

Madison loved being a princess so much that she only wore dresses to kindergarten. She was very careful about getting anything on her dresses or messing up her hair.

One day some of her friends at school started making fun of her because she always wore dresses to school. One girl said, "Why do you wear dresses every day?" Madison said, "Because I am a princess." The little girl, named Kristen, laughed and said, "You are not a princess!" Madison replied by saying, "I am, too, and my father is a King." The little girl looked at her and said, "Your father is not a king." "Yes, He is King of all kings, God of the universe." "No, he is not!" snapped the little girl. Yes He is. I know that for sure and you can be a princess too if you want to." "I can?" Kristen replied.

Kristen just stared at Madison. She didn't quite understand what was being said but Madison sounded so sure of herself. Madison spent the next few minutes explaining about God, how she was God's child and if you are a daughter of a King, you have the title "Princess."

I wish I had a recording to hear the entire conversation, but whatever it was the little girl wore a dress to school the next day and had her hair all fixed just like a princess. It's amazing to me how God has made the plan so simple even a five-year-old can understand it.

One mother called my daughter-in-law Deana and said "Deana, Madison wears dresses to school every day, right?" "Yes, she really likes dresses. She will only wear something else if I make her and there is always a fight and she goes to school crying. I figure it's not worth the turmoil in our home, so she wears dresses most of the time."

The lady said to Deana, "Well, yesterday we had to go to the store and get some dresses because Kristen insists she is a princess."

You know ladies, if you have accepted Jesus Christ as your Lord and Savior, you are a princess too. If we are daughters of the King of kings, then you have the title "Princess" as a birthright.

What does it entail to be a princess? With privilege comes responsibility.

First, you have the responsibility to ask Jesus into your heart. Then comes the privilege of being a princess.

What does it take to behave like a princess? In Matthew 22:37 Jesus tells us to love your God with all your heart.

As women, we compare ourselves to everything that is on television, in

magazines, everybody in our church, and everybody in our neighborhoods. The first thing a princess does? She avoids the comparison trap. We need to avoid the comparison trap. You may have a neighbor who has three beautiful children who are clean all the time. Her home looks like something out of House Beautiful. She has a part-time job. She takes a class at local college, goes to all the Bible studies, and volunteers for the school and church and she is a size 4!

On the other hand, you have two kids, you can't quite get a grip on the house, and you hope the health department doesn't come by.

We always think that the grass is greener on the other side. But you know what? They both have to be mowed!

I saw an interview with Marlo Thomas, Danny Thomas's daughter. She had written a book about different celebrities and athletes and the things that had been said at the right time in a person's life and what it had meant to them. She was on the Katie Curic show. They were talking about her book and the book was to help raise money for St. Jude Children's Hospital.

Katie Curic asked, "Marlo, you have written about so many people. What about you? What is your chapter? What was the most important thing someone said to you in your life?"

Marlo said, "When I was 18 years old, I was in my first summer play and I was so thrilled. The reviews were great. But the vein that ran through the reviews were, will she ever be as good as her dad and will she last as long as her dad." She asked her dad, "How can I ever live up to your legacy? I am going to change my name and be someone else." This is the advice Danny Thomas gave his daughter.

"Marlo, I raised you to be a thoroughbred. And you know what they do? They have blinders on. They get in there and they run their race and they don't pay any attention to what is going on around them. I raised you to be a thoroughbred."

She calmed down and thanked her dad. The next day as she was getting ready for her show, in her dressing room arrived a box with a big red bow on it and the note inside said "Run Your Race Baby." Inside was a set of old horse blinders.

So, you need to run your own race and stop worrying about what is going on around you.

Everyone wants to be accepted by others, but you were not made to fit in. You, as a princess, were created to stand out. To live the kind of life that leads others to Him. Remember, it's your choices that will pave your path to life – God will not force you to do anything. He has given you a free will to walk away from Him or to walk to Him.

You can put on your crown at any time and let people know that you belong to Him. You have a royal call on your life. You have a purpose designed by God. He wants to work in your life to accomplish more than you would ever dare to dream.

We are examples. People watch us and they are waiting to see the choices we make.

Once a professional athlete said, "We have a choice: we can be a good role model or a bad role model." That is the same with us as princesses. We have to always model what is good..

I know how hard it is for us to look at our lives and think of ourselves as royalty. But the truth is, God is our King and we are chosen by Him



things, endure afflictions, do the work of an evangelist, make full proof of thy ministry. For I am now ready to be offered, and the time of my departure is at hand. I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith. Henceforth there is laid up for me a crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous judge, shall give me at that day: and not to me only, but unto all them also that love his appearing.

Response: Ladies, I encourage you to get a crown. Maybe you have one already but they are easily found at your local store. Keep it

close when times come that you doubt your true inheritance. Just place it on your head and say, "I AM A PRINCESS because I am a daughter of THE KING!" Not because of what you have done but what He has done for you.

One day you can exchange this crown for a real crown God has waiting for you. What will your crown look like? Will it be just plain gold? Will it be filled with jewels? It's up to you.

Have you been acting like a princess? Have you been an example so that others will look at you and say, "I want what she has because it is the real thing!"

• From PRIDE page 1 • service will be remembered." By the way, it is not about you and it is not about me and it is good to remind ourselves of that truth daily.

Pride shows up not only in our attitudes and emotions, having an occasional pity party, but it also surfaces by believing you can handle the situation yourself. You begin believing (and it is a lie) that you do not need to seek God's assistance or guidance. You begin to think that you know what you are doing and how to do it. After you begin to "figure out" a few things in the ministry, if you are not very careful, you can give in to the temptation of pride that you now know what you are doing. Blackaby continues, "Selfregard will seek to convince you that you can handle your dilemma through your wisdom, resources, and hard work. Pride will also rob glory from God and seek to give it to you."

Pride amplifies mistreated you believe you have been, causes you to think you can rely on your own skill set, and it causes you to overfocus on comparing your ministry and church to others. Comparison can be very unhealthy, because no church or situation is the same. God desires to work through you in the unique situation where He has placed you. Blackaby speaks to this also: "At times, it is easier to diminish others' spiritual victories than to honestly confront your own failures." Are you prone to run others down to hopefully make it appear that you are a notch above or more spiritual than them? Are you able to rejoice when others see spiritual revival and awakening and you don't?


In God-Initiated Leadership, Bill Elliff challenges us take the "Diotrephes test." Why that test? Because the Bible says this in 3 John 9, "Diotrephes, who loves to be first among them." His problem was a pride problem. He loved to have first place, yet he refused biblical truth. He criticized the leaders while not having a good testimony himself. Bill

challenges us to ask ourselves these questions: "Do I seek to be first? Do I submit to biblical truth? Do I criticize other good leaders? Do I humbly submit to spiritual authority? Do my actions match my words? And, do I have a good testimony?" Great questions to keep us humble.

You must remind yourself that if your goal is to be recognized then your focus is on you more than the glory of God, and God will not share His glory with anyone. But when you see Him for who He really is it should quickly remind you of who you are and who you are not. There are two things you can be 100% sure of: There is a God, and you are not Him. If you truly understand His holiness, then you will never enter His presence without a sense of holy awe. It humbles you as you begin to grasp the incredible price paid at Calvary for you. The ministry is not about making you successful, accomplished, or happy. Our lives and ministry are meant to glorify God and Him alone.

The picture is clear in Isaiah 6:5, "Then said I, Woe is me! for I am undone; because I am a man of unclean lips, and I dwell in the midst of a people of unclean lips: for mine eves have seen the King, the Lord of hosts." Seeing and seeking God's glory causes you to properly bow in His presence. Bill gives us great advice here, "Stay before God in the Word and in prayer long enough to rid yourself of the desire to be known." The way to safeguard against pride is to stay in His presence and allow trusted friends to have the liberty to address any pride they see rising up in you. Listen to notice if you are talking more about you or more about Him.

Man was not made to be worshiped, and when he is, he is not capable of handling it and it can be very destructive. Remain open to evaluating your motives and any pride that is trying to slip up and deceive you. Bill's wisdom points out the danger of pride: "A lifetime of humility can be undermined in a moment of unguarded pride."




Retired BMA Pastor Dies
