James Edwin Hoffmann – A Tribute

Jim Hoffmann and Jamie Eye

(Editor's Note: After hearing of the passing of Bro. James Hoffmann I felt it befitting to dedicate space in this next issue as a tribute to the man who served thirty-three years as editor of our paper. I reached out to his family with this idea and received contributions from his daughter (Jamie Eye) and his son (Jim Hoffmann). What follows is the combined work of those contributions.)

When I say I am the child of a preacher, that is not a fully accurate description. Dad preached, but that's not really what he spent his life doing. Dad was a minister, a pastor, a shepherd. While many thought the important part of his job was done standing in the pulpit, he knew that his job was prayer and study. Not just to prepare for those minutes in the pulpit but to prepare for his real workplace – in kitchens, living rooms, hospital rooms and funeral homes. He understood that God's call for him was not only to teach but to comfort, console and just be there for people. And he never seemed to tire of being there.

People needed the minister, the man of God visible, touchable in their lives. They needed someone who cared. Dad recognized his calling was to be that man reflecting God's love and care to those around him. He did this faithfully day and night for over 60 years.



When the coat and tie came off, Dad didn't change. There weren't two men – the pastor and the other. There was just Dad the follower of Jesus. For Dad, being a pastor, being a Christian, wasn't an occupation, it was a way of life that permeated everything he did and touched everyone he encountered. He didn't just teach God's ways, he tried his best to live them.

Dad grew up attending Bethany Baptist Church of St. Louis, MO. At eighteen he surrendered to preach, and Bethany was the church that ordained him. After high school graduation Dad attended Central Baptist College in Conway. There, when he was supposed to be learning Greek and hermeneutics and sermon construction, he met a young lady from one of the cotton fields just down the road from here. I wonder if she anticipated that holding hands in the dishwater while working in the cafeteria would lead through the hills of Arkansas to the mountains of Alaska to the lakes of Michigan before ending up back at Dad's home church of Bethany. And all along the way they touched lives, made friends and followed God.

Dad's ministry touched a lot of different people in a lot of different

places. He pastored twelve churches in four states, including New Hope (DeSoto, MO), First (Potosi, MO) and Bethany. He served as editor of the Missouri Missionary Baptist newspaper for thirty-three years,

and as State Missions Director for a period of time. He was also involved in Alive and Camp ministries within the State work.

Mom and Dad spent a lifetime together – if you count 61 years of marriage a lifetime – following God. Along the way God blessed them with a son and two daughters, eight grandchildren, and eight great-grandchildren. In his last years most of what he talked about were his great

These last two weeks for me have been an especially trying time. I'm not complaining, just letting you know of a reality, if you will. What the Holy Spirit has offered to me is that this is an excellent opportunity for me to practice the discipline of the joy of the Lord. You know

last time this past summer. He was able to see the Dorm 7 remodel and visit for a while in the dining hall. We will continue to pray for Sis. Mary and the family.

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



What about Accreditation?

Not long after realizing that I needed to gain a seminary education, I began to consider which school to attend. Since my home church affiliated with the Baptist Missionary Association, the BMA Seminary seemed like an obvious choice. So, I leaned heavily toward attending the BMA Seminary. However, before making the final commitment, I wanted to know the answer to one more question, "Is BMA Seminary accredited?" I felt like an accredited school would help ensure that I received a quality education that would be accepted by those who knew the difference between a genuine degree and a degree in name only.

I called the BMA Seminary and spoke with the school's chief academic officer, Dr. Wilbur Benningfield. During the conversation, Dr. Benningfield affirmed that BMA Seminary was indeed accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (now called the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges).

Although that set my mind at ease, I honestly did not know what it meant. After serving nearly 25 years as BMA Seminary's chief academic officer, I learned that not all accreditors are "recognized" accreditors. Many accrediting entities exist but not all are recognized. Perhaps the easiest way to determine if an accrediting agency is recognized is to consult the Council for Higher Education Accreditation's website (www.chea.org). Recognized accreditors will appear in the Directory of Recognized Accrediting Organizations.

These include BMA Seminary's accreditors: SACSCOC and the Commission on Accrediting of the Association of Theological Schools.

Is an accredited seminary education all that important? It can be. Some employers, including churches, expect those they hire to hold earned accredited degrees. Also, most graduate and post-graduate degree programs require accredited degrees as prerequisites to further study at their schools. For example, an accredited master's degree is usually required as a prerequisite for admission into an accredited doctoral program.

The purpose of accreditation is not for accreditors to tell schools what they can or cannot teach. Instead, the primary purposes are to ensure that a school provides a quality education, handles finances with integrity, and communicates accurately with its constituents. Having an accredited degree tells others that you have earned a degree that has met expected standards of quality.

There is benefit from studying God's Word and work at any level, if done correctly. BMA Seminary offers certificates and accredited associate, bachelor's, and master's degrees. These degrees are taught by highly credentialed professors and focus upon equipping individuals for Christ-centered service and leadership roles in various church-related ministries. BMA Seminary holds an unwavering commitment to the authority of Scripture and teaches so as to nurture the historical and doctrinal character of churches in the BMA of America.

Sasha Grebenyuk is one ChangeMaker who has been serving in Ukraine since well before the war began three years ago. In the last three years, five new churches have formed. The gospel is still reaching people, war or no war.



ARE YOU SALTY?

During the sermon last Sunday evening, I realized the verses the pastor preached from were exactly the formula for leaving a lasting legacy in a Christian's life. I've heard them all my life and even taught them to various ages or used them in devotionals. However, I'd never thought of them along the lines of leaving a legacy to others. Yet, these instructions are the ones that Jesus gave to show us how to live. Check out the analogy in Matthew 5:13-16: You are the salt of the earth; but if the salt loses its flavor, how shall it be seasoned? It is then good for nothing but to be thrown out and trampled underfoot by men. You are the light of the world. A city that is set on a hill cannot be hidden. Nor do they light a lamp and put it under a basket, but on a lamp stand, and it gives light to all who are in the house. Let your light so shine before men, that they may see your good works and glorify your Father in heaven.

These are instructions to us as believers. We are to be as salt and light. I love salty food! I hope I never have to do without salt in my food. The world also needs salt, or in other words, Christians. Salt

adds flavor to dishes. Christians add an important "flavor" to the world. With all the sin and depravity in the world, it would be hard to swallow without some salty Christians to change the flavor and make life easier and more palatable. Salt is also a preservative. With all the evil in the world, Christians may be the only thing helping this world preserve until the coming of Christ! It's hard to think what the world would be like without believers.

Salt is also valuable; in fact, that's where the word "salary" comes from. In early days, salt was often traded for goods, just as currency. You may also have heard the phrase "worth his salt," meaning that a person does a good job or is valuable. Just as salt is important in our lives, believers are important in the world as long as we don't lose our "flavor" or value. Salt that was no longer good was taken out and thrown in the road to be walked on. We need to make sure we don't lose our flavor and value.

Jesus also says here that Christians are the light of the world. Can you imagine living in complete darkness? You may remember that in John 9:5, Jesus says, "As long as I am in the world, I am the light of the world." This seems to be a contradiction; however, we have two lights in the physical world today; do we not? There is the sun by day and the moon by night. Jesus compares to the sun, which is the only true light source, just as He is the true light source. Then a Christian compares to the moon, which only reflects the light from the sun. Without the sun (Son), the moon (a believer) does not shine on anything. Just as the moon sometimes shines brighter than other times, so do we as Christians. We sometimes allow the world to get in our way. In

fact, there are times that we completely block out Jesus' light from shining through our lives.

Consider an eclipse. In a solar eclipse, the moon passes between the earth and the sun, thus blocking the light. As humans, we sometimes allow our own lives to become so "important" to us that we block out the light of Jesus shining through us. We try to make it all about ourselves instead of about Him. Then there is the lunar eclipse. That happens when the earth gets between the moon and the sun to block the light. There are times that even Christians allow the sins of the world to enter their lives and block Jesus' light from shining through them.

As these verses say, we should not hide our light or allow anything to get in the way of letting Christ's light shine forth in the world. Whether we realize it or not, people observe us daily. We should be careful to make sure that people see Christ in us rather than the world and its sin.

Are you being "salty" enough to help give the world a better "flavor"? Do you let Jesus' light shine forth in yours? Only by doing these things will you be able to provide a lasting Christian legacy for others.

SCRIPTURE: Matthew 5:13-16; John 1:1-9; 8:12; 9:5; Ephesians 5:8-14; Colossians 4:5-6

Jana (Matt) Hauk of Wentzville, MO. He had eight grandchildren and eight greatgrandchildren.




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Former AR Editor, Pastor, Missionary Dies

grandkids and their children, his great-grandkids. (If that sounds confusing, one of those "great grandkids" has a hyphen – the other is just bragging!)

But Dad didn't just enjoy watching and talking about his family, he had a great influence on our lives. Sometimes ministering to a whole church and community conflicts with being a father. Jamie used to love when we had a guest preacher at church – not because she didn't like Dad's sermons but because it was the only time she got to sit with Dad in church. There were times when important family events were missed because Dad was meeting the critical needs of others. But through it all, with Mom's hard work and support, Dad taught us his faith and love through words and actions. This wasn't something that started with him, for he grew up in a family full of it. But he faithfully passed it on to his children, his grandchildren and his great-grandchildren – through his words and through his life.

Like a lot of men of his generation, Dad could do a little of everything, and a lot of work. He worked hard at being a pastor, always being available for families in need. Often, he was out when I went to bed, sitting with someone at the hospital, and gone when I got up, praying with someone, studying or taking someone to an appointment. Anything that needed done, from digging up a septic line, to repairing electrical wiring, to roofing a house, to fixing the dishwasher or the car, to making rocking horses for the grandkids – Dad could do it. And if he didn't know how, he would figure it out.

Dad enjoyed telling stories, traveling, visiting with friends, playing games, telling stories, woodworking, fishing, hunting, telling stories, good jokes, bad jokes and telling stories. Being in an occupation where the workday never ends didn't leave much time for these pursuits – except for telling stories! In later years, Mom and Dad were able to do more traveling, sometimes with friends or family members but often just the two of them. But in Dad's life there was no distinction between faith, work and fun. He served God, found enjoyment and told stories in all of it.

Dad fought a good fight. He finished his course. He kept the faith.

I've pondered what Dad would say if he was here today. I'm sure he would express his love for Mom and how much he enjoyed their life together, all the places they have been. And he would want you to know how well she has cared for him in these last days.

I expect you would have heard more about his grandkids and great-grandkids.

You probably would have gotten a poem. He was inclined to write them for funerals and other special occasions.

And you might have been told not to be sad, or at least not to let your mourning keep you from rejoicing in his victory.
